## BUYING STATE LANDS

### The Board May Be Forced to Come Nearer to the City

It is stated that great pressure is being brought to bear on the state officials to buy land for the feeble minded institute near the city.

There is a demand that the mute school be moved into the city, and that the feeble minded institution be located with a view to making that change.

The board may be induced to abandon their original plan of buying a large tract of cheaper lands with an immense fuel supply on them, to save a large sum annually.

Lands will cost all the way from \$150 to \$250 per acre within a mile or so of the city limits.

The state board has offers of land with fuel supplies that furnish the state with firewood and fencing materials for all its institutions for years to come and pay for the land itself in a few years.

The state may be compelled to cast away all these advantages to overcome the drawback suffered on account of badly located state institutions, the work of past boards.

## SPEAKER CONTEST WARMING

### W. I. Vawter Says Bourne Lieutenants Opposing Him

Hon. W. I. Vawter, of Medford, passed through the city last night.

He is joint representative of several of the largest counties in Southern and Central Oregon, and is now contesting the field for speaker of the house of representatives with Hon. Frank Davey, of Salem, of whom he speaks in complimentary terms as to his ability and shrewdness as a politician. Mr. Vawter is a successful banker in Jackson county, was a member of the last house, and served as chairman of the committee on appropriations. "If the senate had enacted my bill to put the normal schools under one board of regents, and cut off some of them and put the rest on a basis of professional work only, the people would never have demanded the referendum on their appropriations. Now they feel that they have been endorsed, and it is going to be hard to hold down the appropriations for higher education. I have no pledges to make, beyond using my best endeavors to hold down all appropriations to an economical business administration. The Republican party of Oregon will find that, while it has all but one member of the lower house, it is working on a narrow margin in the state at large, and, unless we have a fairly decent session of the legislature to go before the people with, there is danger of the party getting a knockout at the next election. I am a statement No. 1 man, and expect to vote for the senators chosen by the people, whether I am speaker or not. But I do not like the way some of Mr. Bourne's lieutenants are dipping into the speakership fight. At Portland yesterday Mr. Burke went with one of the Bourne members of the house and tried to take a member's support away from me, and this in the face of Mr. Bourne's solemn assurance that that he was not going to take any hand in the organization of the legislature. I realize that he cannot control the actions of his friends, but just the same it hurts my case. But it will not interfere with my keeping my pledges to the people who elected me, and I shall do all in my power to see their will carried into effect, and think the senatorship should not be mixed up in the matter of the organization fight. I have made a clean contest, and I believe I shall win. The fight has only begun. I do not understand that the Southern Pacific is taking any hand. At least the head officials assured me they would give support to no candidate, and I have had none from that source. If my opponent is the choice of the Republican caucus I shall be the first to tender my congratulations."

While he refused to comment on the action of the Lane county delegation, in going solidly to Mr. Davey, there was a shade of disappointment crept over his features, and he said he had expected different treatment there, as he was a graduate of the State University, and had stood solidly for their interests.

#### Unrest of the Pacific.

The scanty reports which have been brought from New Guinea of devastation wrought by earthquake upon its northern and eastern coasts and upon the adjacent Bismarck archipelago may reasonably be accepted as identifying the record made on October 2 at various observatories. Violent tremors were recorded in the early morning hours of that day at Sydney, New South Wales, and at Perth, Western Australia. From European observatories concordant reports were received from the Isle of Wight and from Laibach, the observer at the latter place determining the seat of the disturbance as 9062 miles from his observatory, a measure which corresponds very closely with the space between Laibach and New Guinea.

It is impossible to consider the disturbances of the Pacific in the current year as lacking some sort of interrelation. The head of that great ocean has long been known as a seat of plastic convulsion, and its shores in particular have served to outline a belt of almost incessant seismic activity. Confining the attention to such disturbances as were of magnitude sufficient to challenge the attention, we have the following record for one-half of the year: San Francisco came clattering down on April 18. On July 19 the new island was cast up in the Bogoslof Islands in the Alaskan sea. On August 16 Valparaiso crumbled in ruins. On October 2 the mountains of New Guinea were rent asunder. To these great movements might be added a host of smaller evidences of the inner might and throes of the reeling earth. Maungan in Savail has been in renewed activity; in Fiji the hot springs of Gau have burst forth with violence hitherto unknown; Japan has been fairly agitated.

One scarcely needs Professor Pickering's theory that the Pacific bed represents the cavity left when the moon was thrown off to recognize that this is a region of terrestrial adjustments as yet far from stable. Whereas the beds of other seas are practically plane in their pelagic depths, the bed of the Pacific is yet raw and deeply sculptured. Measured from its abyssal valleys, the deepest known on earth, to its snow clad summits of 14,000 feet and higher, its masses of extrusion

are not only enormous in the absolute, but they are barely in equilibrium when compared with the wide bases of continental mountain masses. Through these extruded masses the molten matter is still forcing its way to relieve the inner pressure, and at the edges of the tract the shock of slip and fault is commonly manifest.

So far as it is permissible to attempt the explanation of phenomena yet in the early observational stage, it appears possible to trace somewhat of the relation subsisting between these several outbreaks of seismic violence which a half of this year has recorded. The disasters of April, of July and of August marked a disturbance of the eastern edge of the seismic basin, a series of violent new adjustments of the pelagic foundation to the abutting continental mass. Having secured a new pulse of equilibrium at one verge, the pelagic basin has apparently been under internal strain, which has now communicated itself to the lines of weak attachment at the western verge. The eastern adjustment was marked by three violent catastrophes. We lack the data upon which to forecast movements of the earth, yet it would not prove surprising should other earthquakes occur upon this western verge before the Pacific basin has assumed a new pulse and new attachments above its underlying magma.—New York Sun.
