DAVEY GAINING SUPPORT

Sones of Polk and Lincoln May Take a Hand in the Fight

The statement of candidate candidate Vawter that the Bourne forces were backing Davey, of Marion county for speaker seems not to have hurt that gentleman's chances. He started for Portland to look after his fences, and from statements published in the Portland papers, it would appear that new recruits are coming to him. As the matter stands it is the Marion county man against the field. An effort was made to get a statement from Hon. B. F. Jones, of Polk county, today. He is attending court at Dallas, and will enter the ring for results this evening, says he has known for some time that the Bourne forces were going to Davey, and while he has had positive assurances that such was not the wish of Mr. Bourne it seems he could not control his supporters from going to Mr. Davey. What Jones has up his sleeve no one can tell. He is a hard fighter and will be heard from. Mr. Davey gives out the following statement today:

"The statement sent out by the Vawter following that I am Mr. Bourne's candidate for speaker has no foundation in fact, and for good reasons. In the only talk I ever had with Mr. Bourne on the question, after my candidacy for speaker was announced, he assured me he would take no hand in the contest, as at that time four candidates were mentioned, all of whom had signed statement No. 1—Mr. Vawter, Mr. Newell, Mr. Jones and myself—while the other candidate, Mr. Chapin, though he had not signed statement No. 1, had declared himself in favor of Mr. Bourne's election; hence, all being his friends and supporters, he could take no hand and would not.

"I have approached no member of the legislature for his support because of any position he might occupy on the senatorial question. I have considered that matter settled by the vote in June, and I have based my claim to the speakership on the deserts of Marion county, which has not a single state officer in the old or new set, and has not had the speakership for 12 years or the presidency of the senate for 22 years, and on my experience in legislation and on my record as a Republican for over 30 years.

"Every member approached will bear me out in this statement. I want to win or lose on these claims, and I consider it unfair to ring in any false notes while the band is playing."

Portland Oregonian Gossip.
That Davey will probably receive Washington county's three votes for speaker in the Oregon legislature was the information received from that county yesterday. Connell, of Columbia, yesterday signed an agreement in Portland to support Davey and Representative Barrett, of Umatilla, sent word that he and his two colleagues in that county had practically decided to support that candidate. From authentic sources in Linn county it is announced that Brown is disposed to support Vawter, but that that county's three votes were likely to be cast for Davey, on account of the overbalancing influence of Holt and Upmeyer. In Clackamas county, Jones seems to be for Vawter, but Dye appears to prefer Davey, and Huntley yesterday declared himself for the latter candidate, while Campbell, of Clackamas-

Multnomah, would not affirm to report that he is in the Vawter camp with the six Vawter men in Multnomah who declare that he is with them.

The day's development Davey, who appears to have Washington and Umatilla against denials of Vawter, and in a fair way to win Linn and votes in Clackamas. Should proceed in these several directions there is little doubt that he is the successful candidate.

In Multnomah five of the claimed by Vawter have signed agreement to support him—man, Beveridge, Wilson, Chapin Northup. Beutgen, Farrell Campbell have not affixed names to the pact, so that it appears Vawter has but five sure votes Multnomah. Farrell declined sign until seven others have ceded him; and Campbell's assent the Vawter pact seems not yet to been given.

OPPOSED TO JUTE FACTORY

Chamberlain's Message Be Fernist Bag Factory

Governor Chamberlain is grinding away on his message, if the hard work put in upon the document is any indication, it will be a vigorous document. One thing been decided, he will not recommend a jute mill for the manufacture of grain sacks by convict labor. He finds that if all the 300 prisoners could be worked on making them they would not turn out more than enough for Marion county. On the other hand, he finds it will interfere as much with free labor as the making of stoves, as there are about many people employed at making grain bags now as there would prisoners set at that task, if the went into the jute sack manufacturing business. The sacks made in Portland now amount to about \$100,000 in value per annum, and to that extent convict-made sacks would be in competition with free labor. I have a superintendent of such a factory would have to be as able as it takes to run a woolen mill. The message will come out strong good roads and better waterways. The governor expects to attend the Albany transportation convention, and will deliver an address there in the presence of the members of the general assembly, who have been invited to be present.
