## WHISKEY EASILY SHIPPED

## Beverages in Less Concentrated Forms Suffer

## Interview With Secretary of the Oregon Brewers Association

"As far as I am aware," said F. G. J. Ckebach, secretary of the Brewers' Association of Oregon, when asked what he knew about the attitude of the wholesale liquor dealers toward the local option law, as stated in an interview with Attorney Hammond of Coos county, "the brewers of the state of Oregon have no personal grievance against any of the wholesale liquor dealers of the state.

"We have no fight on as against them or their business. They were not responsible for the passage of the local option law, and if they now have come to the conclusion that the local option law is a benefit to them, and increases the sale of whiskey and other strong liquors, they would be very foolish, from a business standpoint, to try to do away with it.

"The brewing industry recognized that the local option law would be a disastrous blow to the manufacture of beer in this state. They knew such would be the effect, for they had the example of other states before them. It has ever followed that where local option forced prohibition into effect in any county or precinct, the sale of beer was almost totally destroyed, while the sale of whiskey was materially increased. Beer is too bulky to ship. Everybody recognizes it when it is shipped to a dry district, and publicity in all such cases is the thing that the purchasers wish to avoid.

"Whiskey can, as every one knows, be shipped in small packages. The dry districts have everywhere been flooded with circulars, sent out by the wholesale dealers of Portland and outside cities, quoting prices and soliciting orders. The trade resulting therefrom has even astonished those engaged in the whiskey business. Their returns are even greater than before local option was passed, and none of them being in the business on account of philanthropic motives, they certainly cannot be blamed for not desiring to disturb the local option law.

"It has always been thus. Prohibition and the increased sales of whiskey go hand in hand. They are apparently strange bed fellows, yet have always discovered sleeping together.

"As I stated before, it would be foolish for the brewers to blame the wholesale whiskey dealers for what they are doing from a business standpoint. The blame, if any, should rest upon the shoulders of those who ill-advisedly forced upon our statutes a law, which in effect works just contrary to what its supporters intended. We are today confronted with the following conditions:

"Minors can get all the whiskey they wish, and no one can control the sale or punish any person for violating the law.

The legitimate and responsible saloonkeeper has been put out of business, and more whiskey and other strong alcoholic drinks are sold than ever before. The mail order shipments, drug stores and 'blind pigs' do the business.

"There is as much, if not more drunkenness; the cities and counties are minus the former revenues, and still are compelled to keep up the same expense as to police protection, etc. The only difference is that this expense comes out of the pockets of the common taxpayer, instead of out of the liquor business. The moral atmosphere of every community is filled and contaminated with hypocrisy, law-breaking and insincerity. The enforcement of laws becomes a farce, and the respect for law a joke and by-word.

"Of course, in time, the dear people will come to realize that a mistake has been made, but, in the meantime, the brewers who have several million dollars in permanent improvements, will have to grin and bear it."

## TAXES HIGHER HIGHER

## Effect of Raised Valuation's Unless Levies are Kept Down

Portland Journal, January 2.) Taxpayers of Portland will this year be required to raise over one-third more money by taxation than in 1906.

The valuation of all property within Multnomah county has been raised and at the same time the levy has gone up. Thus the two forces working together have boosted up the sum which the property owners and taxpayers generally will be required to pay.

All but \$12,000,000 of the county valuation of \$180,900,000 is in the city of Portland. Last year the county valuation was \$142,800,000, showing that for 1907 the valuation has been increased \$37,000,000.

Sixteen mills is to be the total levy for the city this year. This rate raises approximately \$2,894,000, an increase of \$760,000 over the amount paid over by the taxpayers in 1906.

Thus while the valuation has increased \$37,000,000 the levy has climbed up 1.2 mills. There is no question of course that the market value of nearly all property in the county has gone up, especially the most valuable portions of city property.

This increase of \$760,000 will be divided as follows: The port of Portland will get \$39,000 more than last year, the school districts \$105,000 more, the state school \$42,000 more, the county road fund \$125,000 more, the general county fund \$22,000 more, the library \$10,000 more, the city of Portland \$276,000 more, the state tax \$150 more.

The fact that the council of Portland on Monday morning fixed the levy for municipal purposes at 5.7 mills is one of the principal reasons for the high aggregate levy which has been placed upon all property in the city.

When the system of higher valuations and lower levies was adopted it was believed the levy could be kept down. However, so great have been the demands from all quarters that, whereas last year the taxpayers of the county paid for a levy of 14.8 mills upon a valuation of \$142,800,000, this year they will pay a levy of 16 mills upon \$180,900,000.

**High School Bulletin.**  
University of Oregon Bulletin, volume 4, No. 1, state systems of

high school control by Henry Davidson Sheldon, head department of education at the university, with a statistical study of four-year high schools in Oregon, by George W. Hug.

The Bulletin traces the development of the high school through the institution known to the New England settlers as the "grammar school," better designated today as the "Latin school," with the rise of the "academy" during the revolutionary war as a protest against the classical formalism of the old "Latin school," to the formation of the first American high school in 1821 in Boston, and the rapid growth and development since.

Dr. Sheldon describes the various problems which have given rise to state legislation in regard to high schools, and discusses the different policies adopted, with a view to the future policy of our state. One is struck by the lack of uniformity in the legislation of the different states. Only three or four states, New York, Wisconsin, Minnesota and California, have dealt adequately with the subject.
