ADJUTANT GENERAL REPORTS

On Condition of the National Guard in Oregon

"The First Battery, field artillery, should own its own horses. If possible, it should be arranged that, after the horses have become the property of the state, they can be put to use, so that they would become self-supporting.

"The purchase of a permanent camp ground for the Oregon National Guard of not less than 160 acres, where a target range and other permanent improvements may be erected for the use of the troops.

"An ambulance wagon should be purchased for the use of the hospital corps.

"Another issue of khaki clothing and olive drab woolen shirts should be made to the entire guard as soon as possible.

"With the addition of transportation, socks and underwear, the Oregon National Guard can be ready immediately for domestic or foreign service in the field or on any call of the President or governor."

These are the most important recommendations made by Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer, of the Oregon National Guard, in his biennial report to the governor and the legislature, now on file and being printed. The report is an exhaustive one, and covers in detail every branch of the organization, its movements, progress, strength, equipment and improvement in the use of the rifle, etc., during the period covered by the report, which is quite a satisfactory showing.

The Chinese famine will be partly relieved by a shipment of 15,000 bags of American flour.

A league has been organized in Chicago to push President Roosevelt for a third term.

The freight rate on apples from Huntington to Portland has been reduced from 65 to 40 cents per 100 pounds.

It is claimed that the federal government at Washington will not permit the Hawaiian legislature to pass any laws restricting Japanese rights in the Sandwich Islands.
