PORTLAND PAPER EXPLAIN

every possible place. Private detectives and friends looked for him in vain. At noon today Mr. Davey returned home, and this afternoon is with his wife and son at St. Johns.

It was considered suspicious by those who have been watching the political situation that Davey should disappear on the eve of his apparent triumph as speaker. Davey has more votes pledged than are needed to elect him, but when the news was circulated that he had disappeared it was feared for a time that his chances were injured. His return makes him still the dominant factor in the speakership fight.

Frank Davey, candidate for speaker of the house in the next legislature, who has been missing since Thursday night reached the city today, and after meeting his wife at the home of her brother, J. N. Pearcy, left with her for St. Johns. He will return to Portland this evening, and meet his political friends in an effort to stop the landslide which had been started against him on account of his unaccountable disappearance. This information was given by his brother-in-law, J. N. Pearcy, late this afternoon.

Chaos reigned in political circles this morning on account of the complete, baffling disappearance of Frank Davey, of Marion county, presumably the leading candidate for speaker of the house. It is still doubtful whether his reappearance will stay the disintegration of his forces. Since Thursday night, when Davey was last seen in Portland, absolutely nothing had been heard of him, and his family and friends were utterly at a loss to account for the freak of fate or chance fortune which had to all practical purposes removed him from the political arena.

It is reported by his friends that Mr. Davey was worn out with the stress of his campaign, and when he became flood-bound in the city and was unable to return home went to Seaside, where he has been resting since that time, and until his return to Portland this afternoon.

What effect his late return will have upon his candidacy is not now known, as it is expected that some change in the political line-up will yet result from his uncertain action. The meeting of the delegation to be held this evening, at which the Davey column will meet with the Vawter forces and with Vawter himself, will have much to do with deciding Mr. Davey's fate.

Jefferson Damage Case.

In the circuit court today the entire time has been consumed in the trial of the damage case of Mrs. Thurman against E. A. Aupperle. The following named men constitute the jury: H. Benson, M. J. Petzel, Ernest Anderson, Stephen Murton, E. W. Ross, J. A. Pooler, P. L. Darling, Oscar Dick, Jesse Macy, J. L. Edison, E. G. White and Anton Kufner. Several of the witnesses of the prosecution have been examined, and the case will probably take considerable of the court's time tomorrow.
