Multnomah's Assessment Summary-- The summary of the assessment roll for Multnomah county was filed in the office of the secretary of state

this morning, showing the total amount of the taxable property valuation to be \$180,894,548.

Union County's Expenses-- A statement received from County Clerk J. B. Gilham, of Union county, by Secretary of State Dunbar this morning, which is in compliance with the provisions of section 2088 of the code, prescribing the method in which the state taxes shall be apportioned, shows that county's expenses, except for roads and highways, reached the total of \$20,550-11.

Effective Thursday-- The new city ordinance under which all Salem saloons will close from midnight to 5 a. m., will go into effect Thursday night. There is no opposition to it among the retail liquor dealers.

Early Closing Ordinance-- Saloon men are hereby notified that the closing ordinance goes into effect Thursday, January 10, at midnight. The ordinance requires all saloons to close at 12 p. m. and remain closed until 5 a. m. OPPOSE HIGHER TAXES

Levies Made By Four Different Taxing Bodies

A Salem special to the Oregonian is exciting considerable comment. It appears today and reads as follows:

A great storm of protest has been created by the announcement of the heavy increase in taxes, as levied by the county court last week. That the taxpayers of this county have their wrath aroused is evident from the talk that may be heard whenever the subject is mentioned.

The county levy is for \$113,000 this year, as compared with \$63,000 last year. This, together, with a higher state, city and school district tax, in a city where the taxes are already heavy, has aroused much criticism, and there is talk of a concerted movement for the purpose of inducing the county court to reduce the levy. A public meeting may be called to consider the matter.

It was ascertained today that if the levy be not reduced, resort will be had to the courts, if any possible chance of defeating the levy entirely can be discovered.

One well-known citizen remarked today that the tax-collector will need a bodyguard when the farmers come in to pay their taxes in March.

(It is not believed at Salem that any of the levies can be recalled, as they are made by four different taxing bodies, all based on high valuations.)

TREASURER MOORE'S REPORT

Shows Reduction in Sums of State Funds Carried

State Treasurer Moore this morning issued his semi-annual statement of the condition of the several funds in the treasury, showing there was a total of \$488,695.23 on hand December 31, 1906, as against \$1,140,947.42 on July 1, the date of the issue of the last previous report.

Of this amount there is \$201,725.50 in the general fund. The greatest amount besides this, \$113,419.74, belongs to the common school fund, interest. The amount of the school fund, principal, loaned up to December 31, was \$3,793,281.89, on 6 per cent interest, and the amount of the school fund loaned on school district bonds, at 5 and 6 per cent interest, was \$334,225. There now remains \$73,762.44 in the school fund, principal, not loaned out, but it is going rapidly, and will probably be all loaned out within three months, in the estimation of Treasurer Moore.

The amount loaned out of the Agricultural College fund principal up to December 31st was \$169,913.16, and from the University fund, principal, \$95,458.44, all on 6 per cent bonds.
