KINNING INSURANCE TRUSTS

Sublimity Farmers Show How It Can Be Done at 18c a Year Per \$100

Sublimity, Or., Jan. 11.—On the 11th inst., the Farmers' Fire Relief Association of Sublimity, Oregon, held its eleventh annual session at this place. That the farmers around Sublimity, and from various other localities, well know how to appreciate reliable, economical and well-conducted mutual benevolent insurance is shown by the large attendance, and by the interest shown in the proceedings. The secretary's eleventh annual report showed that they issued 25 new policies during the last year, insuring 56 buildings and contents for the amount of \$16,741, and that they had at present in force 204 policies, insuring 404 buildings and contents for the amount of \$120,349, and that the association was now doing business for ten and one-fourth years and the total amount of cost for that time for fire losses and running expenses of the association was only \$1.80 per \$100. The treasurer's eleventh annual report was: January 1, 1906, cash on hand, \$31.31; received by assessments, \$324.75; from applications of new members, \$16.85; total received, \$372.91. Paid out for fire losses, \$215; for filing annual report with secretary of state, \$10; for printing, \$13.25; officers' salaries, \$35; for postage and all other incidental expenses, \$10.35; total paid out, \$283.50; cash on hand December 31, 1906, \$89.31.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Charles Fischer, president; Sublimity; Chas. Hottinger, secretary and treasurer; Sublimity; directors, Martin E. Smith, Whiteaker; P. C. Freres, Klumb; F. L. Pound, Aumsville; James Stupfel, Mount Angel; B. Minten, Kingston.

OREGON CITIZENS PROTEST

The people of central Oregon are signing eagerly a resolution condemning the reclamation service for its act of claiming the whole Deschutes valley ostensibly for the water power needed to pump water out of the Umatilla river, says the Prineville Review. The resolution is accompanied by a petition, which is part of the document, praying that right of way for the Oregon Trunk Line be granted to the company which will build the railroad along the river as originally surveyed from the Columbia to Madras.

Following is the text of the resolution and petition.

"Whereas, a filing for water power has been made by the U. S. reclamation service on the Deschutes river below Madras, and has caused the grant of the right of way for railroad in the canyon along the river applied for by the Oregon Trunk Line incorporated, to be refused by the department of the interior; and whereas, such action on the part of the reclamation service and the department of the interior is against the interests of the general public and will stop the development already begun in Crook county and seriously injure the lumber interests, and irrigation projects under way, and largely completed and will tend to prevent further investment of outside capital and further settlement of the country and perpetuate the present hardships of the inhabitants; "Now, therefore, your petitioners, residents of Oregon and of Crook county, the undersigned, respectfully petition the department of the interior that the right of way applied for by the Oregon Trunk Line incorporated, be granted and to permit a railroad to be built in accordance with the maps filed and that the filing heretofore made by the U. S. reclamation service be withdrawn to the end that transportation facilities be afforded for the people and the traffic of a territory larger than some of the Eastern states and with boundless possibilities in agriculture, manufactures and commerce.

"Your petitioners further represent that the route of the Oregon Trunk Line is the most feasible by reason of location, grade and accessibility to transcontinental lines and water transportation and the only one upon which work has been begun. Wherefore they pray that such right of way be granted and interference therewith cease."

The signatures to this document already number many hundreds and the list is increasing day by day. Those who have signed it, however, are of the opinion that it will be of no effect. The Deschutes Development company, of which ex-Congress-

Cotton in England.

London, Jan. 11.—The imports of raw cotton into the United Kingdom from the United States during the first eight months of 1906 were \$10,480,000 less than during the same months of 1905, but \$7,953,199 more than during the same months of 1904. The decrease in the American product was made up by the imports from Brazil and Egypt. Notwithstanding the decrease American cotton constituted about 67 per cent of the total imports into the United Kingdom during the first eight months of 1906.
