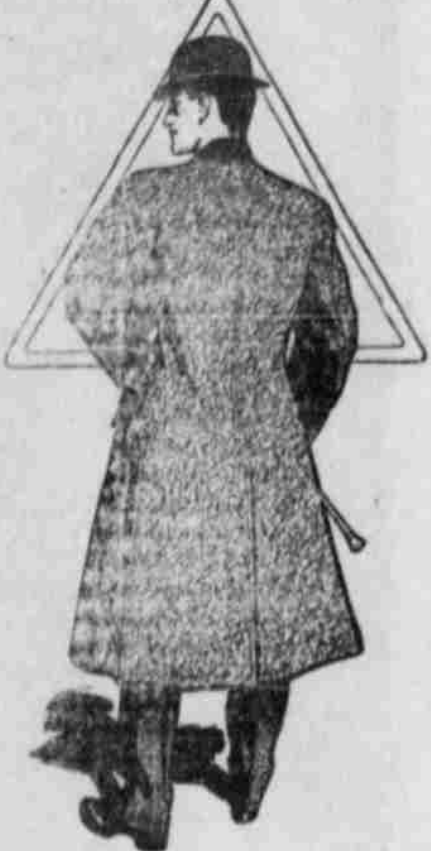

**STATE SUPREME COURT**

Justice Hailey on Retiring Cleans Up His Desk

The following decisions were rendered in the supreme court today:

In an opinion by Justice Moore judgment of Judge Gantenbein, Multnomah county, was reversed, and a new trial ordered in the case of the State vs. Charles Bock, convicted of assault with a dangerous weapon in connection with the assault upon the crew of the ship Johann Paulsen, in Portland harbor, on the ground that the court erred in the use of the word "defendant" in assuming the existence of facts which are disputed. The court overruled the point raised that the indictment was invalid because of the dismissal of Olaf Akeyson from the grand jury which returned it, and the substitution of another juror.

State, ex rel. Baker City Lodge A. F. & A. M. vs. Siber; reversed and new trial ordered.

State vs. Holliver Megordon, Malheur county, for killing his wife; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Hailey.

Frank T. Gray vs. Columbia and O. C. Ry Co.; affirmed.

S. A. Hellner, respondent, vs. John P. and Thomas Smith, appellants; from Baker county; Samuel White, Judge; affirmed. Opinion by Chief Justice Bean.

E. A. Eaton, appellant, vs. Edward Blackburn, et al., respondents; from Baker county; Samuel White, Judge; reversed and new trial ordered. Opinion by Justice Moore.

Nellie Washington, plaintiff, vs. John B. Cleland, defendant; motion for writ of mandamus dismissed by Justice Hailey.

This is the last batch of decisions in which Justice T. G. Hailey participates before retiring.
