**TAYLOR SELLING SAWMILL**

**Former Salem Man Disposes of Detroit Property to Portland Interests**

It is reported that a deal was consummated at the Willamette hotel yesterday afternoon, whereby J. A. Taylor, a former business man of this city, transferred his sawmill property at Detroit to the F. C. Graham Wholesale Lumber Company, of Portland. F. C. Graham, of Astoria, represented the company in the deal, and Mr. Taylor carried on negotiations in his own behalf. The amount of the consideration could not be learned. The capacity of the plant is about 15,000 feet daily, but it is regarded as a valuable property on account of being located in an extensive and wealthy timber district.

Ed. Journal: The various granges in this county are appointing committees to call upon the county court and ask to be shown the details of improvement to be made in Marion county court house. The Portland Daily Abstract says these repairs will cost \$30,000. These granges wish to see a little more publicity in such matters of large expenditure of the people's money. Let our county papers be given a statement and diagram of the work and let everybody understand it. Probably there will be no objection if it is understood. But the farmer is taxed so heavily that he cannot be expected to rejoice in the recent announcement of tax levy.

**Will Watch Bills.**  
The state grange will maintain a

next legislature, to see that agricultural interests are not overlooked. There are three subjects of special importance to the grange. The repeal of the Tuttle road law, with its provisions for interest-bearing, non-taxable bonds, will be demanded. Another effort will be made to reduce the right of courtesy to a life estate in one-half the wife's property. Instead of a tenancy by courtesy in all property. This will make the courtesy and dower rights just equal in Oregon.

And, lastly, the grange will not endorse any change in the two tax laws enacted by the people last June, placing two per cent tax upon the gross earnings of telephone and telegraph companies, and a three per cent tax upon the gross earnings of express and oil companies, and of refrigerator and sleeping cars. If the legislature presumes to meddle with those laws the grange will use the referendum. It has \$2000 set aside for referring any acts which are opposed to the interests of the people. If the emergency clause be used to defeat a referendum, the state grange will re-enact these laws by initiative, at the next election, and will besides, attempt to reduce the use of that emergency clause. The voice of the people has declared that hereafter these six corporations must pay something towards supporting the state government, and all taxpayers are interested in maintaining these laws. These tax laws piled up the biggest majority ever seen upon our ballot! Eleven to one for the first step in a more equal system of taxation.
