UNTAXED FRANCHISE.

Cause of a Big Lawsuit in the Sucker State.

Springfield, Ill., Jan. 14.—The attorney-general this morning filed a suit asking the supreme court to take original jurisdiction in the case of the state seeking to recover taxes claimed to be due from the Illinois Central railroad. The amount is unnamed, and the accountants variously estimate it from three to fifty millions. It is impossible to state truthfully the amount involved until the investigation is complete. The road pleads to the jurisdiction of the court, and says it should be a federal case.

Funeral of Jasper Minto.

The funeral of the late Jasper Minto was held Sunday and was attended by a large number of friends and citizens.

His funeral was held from the old Minto place in South Salem at 2 o'clock, and the following old friends and associates acted as pall bearers: Judge George H. Burnett, Sheriff W. J. Culver, A. C. Dilley, Clayborn Walker, E. M. LaFore and F. T. Wrightman.

Deceased was born April 27, 1855, at the Minto homestead five miles south of Salem.

He was married in October, 1876, to Miss Minnie Byrne, who died in a few years. They had one son, Frank, who is now in Alaska. March 18, 1883, he was married to Miss Ella Powell, who with one daughter, Buena, survives him. They were both at his bedside during his last hours. He was a son of Hon. and Mrs. John Minto, beloved and respected pioneers. His mother preceded him on September 6, 1904, but he leaves the aged father, three brothers, John W., postmaster of Portland; Harry P., deputy sheriff here; and Douglas C., a prominent dairy and hop man, and one sister, Mrs. Robert C. Halley, to mourn his demise.

Railroad Plea on Coal.

St. Paul, Jan. 14.—Louis W. Hill, son of J. J. Hill, of the Great Northern railroad, is in the West, investigating the coal famine, and wired his father as follows: "I find a combination of the fuel dealers in the Dakotas and at the head of the lakes, and not the coal shortage, is responsible for the fuel famine. Parties trying to get coal delivered early last fall were refused by those firms. The retail dealers formed a combine which controls the coal business of the Northwest, and will boycott any Duluth or Superior firms selling to outsiders. If the retailers' combine assumes control of the entire trade it should have anticipated the demand. They cannot expect the railroads to supply towns with a car at a time. The responsibility should rest on the retailers at present controlling the business, and not upon us."

Prelate Consigned to Earth.

San Francisco, Jan. 14.—The remains of Archbishop Montgomery were interred this afternoon. The services at the church and the funeral at the cemetery were the most magnificent in the history of the city. Fully 8000 members of Catholic societies formed part of the pageant. Services at the grave were fully as impressive as those at the church. Archbishop Riordan threw the first clod of earth on the coffin as it was lowered into the grave.

Big Copper Strike.

Ogden, Utah, Jan. 14.—A big strike has begun made at Lakeside, Copper county, 20 miles from this city. Native copper running 50 per cent was found in large quantities in a vein 40 feet wide. There is a big rush to the scene. Miners think it is the biggest thing ever found west of the Rocky range.

Fatal Bullet at Party.

Chicago, Jan. 14.—Mrs. Hannah Healey, aged 26, was shot and killed accidentally last night. There was a party at her home, just following the christening of her baby at the church. Policeman Dyer was a guest, and, in removing his coat, accidental-

ly caught the trigger of his revolver on his clothes, and it was discharged with deadly effect. The baby was unharmed, and it was so plainly an accident the officer has not been held to account.

Lobbies Guide the Hands.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 14.—Braxton Comer was inaugurated governor of Alabama. The legislature is with him, insuring sweeping reforms, especially in railroad rates and control of corporations. In his address he says: "Everybody knows the railroads have maintained lobbies at the state house for the purpose of guiding the hands that make the laws, establishing their relations to the business of the state."
