

WOODBURN MAN FOUND GUILTY

Submitted to Jury At 3:45
P.M.—Verdict Returned in
40 Minutes Sympathy For
Remington

Complete silence reigned in the crowded court room Wednesday afternoon when the jury, in the case of the state of Oregon against E. L. Remington knocked on their door, after having been out less than an hour. The defendant sat, during the breathless silence with an anxious expression and as the words "Guilty as charged" fell upon his ears he turned a shade paler and his head dropped with an humiliated and disappointed air.

The sympathy of the crowd was visibly with the defendant and when the meaning of the jury's message was grasped by those present a murmur of regret was quite evident. The charge in the complaint was assault upon W. W. Slaughter with intent to kill and after a two days trial, in which many witnesses were used to prove the good standing of the defendant and show the conditions and motives of the shooting, the judge gave a short charge to the jury and sent them to the jury room at 3:45 last afternoon.

Many articles, such as guns, fence pickets, maps, etc., were used in the trial. The gun used by Mr. Remington was a 30 caliber, using soft nosed bullets—a weapon which is unlawful to use as a hunting gun and this fact and that the shooting occurred on Mr. Slaughter's place were probably the two most convicting points to show that the affair was premeditated. Then on the stand the defendant swore that he hid his rifle after the shooting in order that he might not terrorize two ladies who were approaching which was also thought to be weak testimony.

The plea of the defense was that he was justifiable in self defense.

Judge Burnett has set Saturday, January 19, at 9 o'clock a. m., as the time to pronounce sentence. The penalty in this class of cases is from one to ten years in the penitentiary. It is thought by many that owing to the circumstances surrounding the affair and the good standing of the convicted man, that the sentence will be light.

Deputy District Attorney McNary conducted the prosecution, while Attorney Grant Corby represented the defense.

LINN, LANE' BOUNDARY

Has Been Agreed Upon and
Will Be Legalized
at Once.

The members of the legislature from Linn and Lane counties have reached a harmonious agreement as to a boundary line between those two counties, which will probably be enacted into law and mark the permanent division of territory between these two sub-divisions of Oregon. Neither county will gain or lose much by the new county division, and the people of both counties will be accommodated, and the county courts will be able to promote permanent highway construction.

The conference reached an agreement Wednesday afternoon, and was composed of Senators Bingham and Booth, Representatives Eaton, Edwards and Washburn of Lane, and Senators M. A. Miller, F. J. Miller and Representatives Brown, Holt and Upmeyer, of Linn. Mr. Brown was instructed to have a bill drafted describing the new boundary line about as follows: Leaving the present boundary at 15-4 east it follows the summit line of the mountain range dividing the McKenzie Call-poola watersheds to the west until it reaches the township line between ranges 1 and 2 west, in township 15 south, where it drops south to the northwest corner of Mabel precinct; thence two miles due west on section line to a point four miles south to intersect the present county line. It is a perfectly natural division, and gives each county its tributary territory. Mr. Brown was elected representative on this issue, and is very

much delighted at being able to keep his pledge to have this matter rectified, as it has been a thorn in the side of both counties for a long time. It gives to each county the land that geographically belongs to it, and the residents of both sections will do business with their own county seat.
