companies of a similar character, having an interchange of business; large shippers of live stock; transportation of patients committed to almshouses, institutions, penal institutions, and their attendants; soldiers' home inmates, and provides for a reduced rate of transportation for the national and state governments, especially in the transportation of troops, etc.

He would also amend the state hunter's license law so as to increase the license of non-resident hunters from \$10 per year to \$25 and would remove the present license imposed upon resident citizens.

Elect Road Supervisors.

In presenting the bill proposing to make district road supervisors elective instead of appointive, Mr. Jackson says that the present method is odious to county courts generally and that they would like very much to be relieved of the responsibility and extra work and worry connected with the duty. He says that there is already a law upon the statutes which provides that supervisors shall be elected by popular vote but that a subsequent act is negative to the original one and virtually repeals it by implication.

"It is only a question of a very few years," said Mr. Jackson, "until the entire state will be strung with a perfect network of wires for the transmission of electricity for light, power, etc., and the bill which I have introduced anticipates a squabble between the power and electricity generating corporations and the railroads and it is designed to prevent the occurrence of such wrangles and possible litigation over right of way privileges."

Profanity on Horseback.

If the bill introduced by Representative Barrett, of Umatilla, becomes a law any person caught driving any horse, mule or other animal on the sidewalk, or ride through the streets of any incorporated town or village at a greater speed than six miles per hour, or use obscene or abusive language in same, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50. All of the incorporated cities and towns of the state affected their own protection in this line by the provision of their charter and this measure contemplates extending the same protection to unincorporated communities by the state.

To Down the Lobbyists.

"Down with the obnoxious lobbyist" is the purport of a measure which was introduced by Representative C. A. Barrett, of Umatilla county, yesterday afternoon at the request of District Attorney Phelps. The bill was read for the first time, passed on to the second reading and is now in the hands of the state printer. The bill provides that any person who shall willingly or corruptly give, offer or promise to give any gift, gratuity, bribe, or attempt to give, offer or promise of any of the above to any public official, legislator, or member of the judiciary of this state, shall be deemed guilty of a felony, upon conviction and subject to punishment by imprisonment in the penitentiary for not more than

House Resolutions Adopted.

House resolutions reported favorably in whole and as amended, follow:

No. 5, restricting the privileges of the floor to members, officers and press representatives.

No. 7, furnishing members and chief clerk with copies of the code, general laws of 1905, and house journals.

No. 8, adopting rules of 1905 for present session.

No. 12, allowing members choice five daily newspapers.

No. 16, "Inviting" ministers of gospel to attend sessions and open with prayer.

No. 17, (amended) furnishing members and chief clerk with 200-cent and 100-cent newspaper wrappers.

No. 18, to appoint special messenger to carry bills between the house and senate. (Amended from "printer" to "senate.")

Aurora Local News.

Aurora, Or., Jan. 17.—The extreme cold weather that has prevailed in this section since Sunday has occasioned much discomfort to householders. Pumps around the city are frozen up, and residences equipped with water works have to go dry or get their water from the few pumps that are still open. Ice six inches thick has formed on the big ponds made by the backwater from the Pudding and Willamette rivers, and every one who has a pair of skates is taking advantage of the conditions. Old-timers say it is the coldest snap at this season of the year they have known.

The 8-inch hole the contractor is boring for the water works plant here is down 170 feet, and there is 100 feet of water. A large pump has been ordered from Portland to pump the water out with, in order to see if there will be a constant flow at the present depth.

Fruit growers and orchardmen in this vicinity have begun to chop down their old scaly and moss-covered trees, preparatory to cleaning up their orchards. Around here the state spraying law will be generally observed. The fruit raisers are well pleased with the recent cold snap, as they say it will result in a big crop of all kinds of fruit this year.

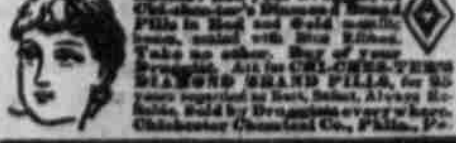
