## ADAMS GETS VERDICT

### After Seven Hours Deliberation Jury Gives Judgment of \$1000 For Plaintiff

After quite a lengthy trial, in which many letters and documents were used as evidence, the case of A. B. Adams against J. T. Wentworth, the local commission merchant, went to the jury late yesterday afternoon. It was near the hour of 12 o'clock last night when a judgment was given for \$1000 in favor of the plaintiff.

Otto J. Kramer, of Portland, made an eloquent plea for his client, Mr. Adams, representing him to be a poor, hard-working young man, who bought the stock owned by Mr. Wentworth in a concern called the National Brokerage Co. The stock was found to be of little value, and in the Marion county court the said Adams demanded his money back.

Mr. Wentworth claimed that he bought the stock himself only a short time before selling it to Adams, and that the said Adams knew as much about the stock as he did.

The defendant is the prosperous commission merchant of this city, and has many warm friends here. It is to be regretted that he, as well as Mr. Adams, was unfortunate enough to be the victim of the bogus concern.

### STARTED BY REQUEST.

### Legislative Looters in Sacramento Are Surprised When Asked to Work.

The senate added to the patronage this morning four new members to the army of organized and legalized loot, which is now the scandal of the present session of the legislature. Senator Caminetti voted a loud "no" against the resolution passing out the workless jobs, but that is as far as it went. The attaches were named by Senator Keane, of San Francisco, who declared they were within the patronage allowance.

There were not 500 attaches in attendance at the session this morning. There are more than 500 attaches, and they are all drawing from \$3 to \$5 a day, including Sundays. The grand total of their bills before the session will probably exceed \$135,000. The grand total of the work performed by them will probably not exceed \$135.

There are so many attaches and there is such a sudden desire to keep some track of them that it has been suggested that the legislature purchase a time clock and make the army of workless parasites punch it at regular intervals daily, and have their time checks made out accordingly. This, of course, would prevent to some extent the absentee attaches drawing pay. It might at least force on them the common decency of attending the session, whether they work or not. This time clock suggestion, however, is not received with favor by the horde of useless attaches, and as it would appear that their wishes are respected by a majority of the legislators, it is not likely that the state will be put to the expense of purchasing one of the contrivances.

### Porters Almost Riot.

There was almost a riot late Saturday when some of the attaches were asked to work. They were requested in the politest language, at that, but they took it as an insult to their dignity that they should be requested to do any real labor in return for the money which they are permitted to loot from the state treasury.

### Telegraphic Briefs.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 18.—Statistics show that during 1906 1252 were sentenced to death for political offenses, thousands sent to the mines of Siberia and 732 editors prosecuted. At Cincinnati it is estimated that 10,000 people are homeless on account of floods. The river is rising and the rains continue.

## SEATTLE YUKON SHOW

### Provisional Commission Will Ask For \$150,000

Hon. W. H. Wehrung, of Hillsboro, a member of the provisional commission appointed by Governor Chamberlain to look after the interests of Oregon at the coming Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, at Seattle in 1909, is in the city today and brought with him the draft of a bill which will be introduced in the legislature early next week, creating a permanent commission and appropriating \$150,000 for the use of this commission.

The provisional commission which

was appointed by the governor last fall is composed of Mr. Wehrung, chairman; Henry E. Reed, E. W. Rowe, M. D. Wisdom and Senator J. O. Booth.

The proposed bill provides that the governor appoint a permanent commission of five, who shall organize themselves and have carte blanche over the affairs of the exposition, as far as the state of Oregon is concerned.

It is provided in the bill that this shall not interfere with private contributions for the fair, but all private funds shall be kept separate and intact from the state appropriation.

The bill is a lengthy one and goes into detail as to what exhibits shall be represented at Seattle, and the entire field of commerce, agriculture, mining, dairying, education, etc., is represented.

Mr. Wehrung said this morning that it had not yet been determined who shall introduce the bill, but it is generally believed that some member from Multnomah county will stand sponsor for it.
