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MANY WRECKS TODAY KINGSTON CONDITIONS BETTER LUMBER RATES ADVANCED EARTHQUAKE IN TEXAS MINING STRIKE ENDED

WHOLE TRAIN SMASHED IN HEAVY FOG

Ran Into Fast Freight--Train Dispatcher
Made Frantic Efforts to Prevent the
Wreck.

Fowler, Ind., Jan. 19.—At least 25 were killed and 40 injured in a wreck of the fast Big Four passenger train No. 38, on the Chicago & Cincinnati road. It collided with a fast freight here early this morning. At least 25 of the injured will die. The wreckage caught fire.

The Queen City Special.
Train No. 38 left Chicago at 11:30 last night and was due at Fowler, Ind., the scene of the wreck, about

2:30 this morning. The train is known as the Queen City special, and carries a sleeping car and day coach from Chicago to Cincinnati, and a sleeping car from Chicago to Cincinnati.

A later telephone message from Lafayette says:

"Soon after the wreck occurred the wreckage took fire from the engine, and for this reason several bodies may not be accounted for, if they are in the burning wreckage. The crews of both engines are mis-

A BETTER CONDITION PREVAILS

Death Losses Continue at Kingston--
Subterranean Shocks Caused Sinking
Harbor.

Washington, Jan. 19.—A dispatch from Evans says the Whipple has returned from Guantanamo, and that the commander reports all the Americans safe, the wharves intact, the shipping unharmed. Blue jackets are guarding the consular possessions. The Indiana has landed 50 Americans, who sailed on the Prinz Heinrich on the 17th.

London, Jan. 19.—A dispatch from Kingston says 700 are buried and 1017 victims recovered from the ruins. Many are missing.

Galveston, Jan. 19.—The steamer Panama, Isle reports by cable that seismic disturbances occurred off the shore, about 25 miles from Jamaica, since Monday. It is believed a subterranean quake is responsible for deepening the water at Kingston harbor. The city water supply is restored, but 20 deaths are reported this morning. Ten bodies were recovered from the bay, believed to be persons who fell from vessels during the panic. Kingston is still in danger of sinking into the sea. Measurements today show that the sea is daily encroaching, and advanced several feet yesterday. Great fissures at the water edge run back inland many feet deep, and several slides occurred today.

Many Wrecks Reported.

Kingston, Jan. 19.—The steamer Prinz Frederick is ashore, and tugs have gone to her assistance. This is the third vessel ashore in this vicinity, two on account of the quake. It is believed there will be more wrecks as the bottom of the ocean has been heaved up in some places, while it has been sunk in others. Soundings will have to be taken and new charts of the seas constructed of the seismic area.

Quake in Texas.

Amarillo, Tex., Jan. 19.—A slight

CAWOOD HEARD FROM

Caused People to Get Hys-
terics and Neglect
Stock

E. E. Cawood, former dentist at Portland, who in 1903-4 and again in 1905, held religious meetings at North Salem and other places in Marion county, has got into trouble. The Spokane Chronicle of January 15th, has the following:

Cawood Heard From.

A revivalist preacher named Cawood, who in his career has had some lively experiences, ranging from tar and feathers at Goldendale to complaints to the police of various cities, has appeared in Snohomish. Cawood came here because short notice was given him by a vigilance committee at Roosevelt to terminate his services there and get out, says a Snohomish report.

A few weeks ago Cawood dropped out of sight in Everett, only to reappear at Roosevelt, five miles east of here. For three weeks past he has been holding services at the Radcliff home, gathering around him devotees from surrounding farms. His followers became so enthusiastic and hysterical that the stay-at-the-meetings day and night, neglecting their stock.

Neighbors of those led astray by Cawood banded together and went in a body to one of the meetings, but (Continued on Page 5.)

Dispatcher Tried to Stop Train.

The train on the main line of the Big Four was going at 50 miles an hour. The dispatcher knew that, on account of the dense fog, the engineer could not see the signal directing him to stop, as the westbound freight had the right of way. The dispatcher went out and waved his lantern and fired several shots from his revolver, but failed to attract the train men's attention. Both firemen were killed, the engineers escaping by jumping. Twenty of the dead were cremated. A fire followed immediately. Only two passengers were saved from the smoker. None were injured in the sleepers. No sleepers were burned, as at first reported.

Details of Wreck.

Indianapolis, Jan. 19.—General Superintendent Dougherty says the fog caused the wreck. He says eight were killed outright and 15 others burned to death.

Most of the casualties were in the combination car. Mrs. Schaff, wife of the road's vice-president, was on the train, in her husband's private car, and is unhurt.
