DETAILS FROM EARTHQUAKE

It Was the Worst in Two Hundred and Fifty Years.

London, Jan. 18.—A brief dispatch from Governor Swetenham, of Jamaica, this morning announces that Sir James Ferguson's body was found in the ruins of a cigar store and has been buried. An undated dispatch from the member of the Jones party says: "A ghastly procession of carts, carrying bodies in batches of 20, has passed all day through the streets to the burial grounds. The quake is more serious than any for 250 years. The great shock was followed by 15 minor ones, but there was no tidal wave. The pallisades were broken through and black mud is oozing to the surface. Miss Thomas, a woman telegraph operator, was among the killed."

NATIONAL WOOL MEN

Are Meeting in the City of the Latter Day Saints.

Salt Lake, Jan. 18.—At the National Wool Growers association convention the policy of the government regarding range and forest reserves is receiving much attention. Chief Forester Gifford and Chief Inspector Potter are here representing President Roosevelt, who sent personal greetings and in his message assured the convention their interests would receive his careful consideration.

IDAHO ANTI-PASS BILL

Was Amended to Go into Effect Immediately.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 18.—A sensational scene was enacted in the house today when Representative McCracken arose from his seat and flourished a Short Line pass, saying it had been given him last night to influence railroad legislation. The anti-pass bill takes effect a year hence. A report was favorably received and amended, on McCracken's motion that it go into effect at once. It carried by almost unanimous vote.

CALIFORNIA WILL RESIST

Effort of Federal Government to Force Japs Into Schools.

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 18.—Senator Caminetti, Democrat, taking cognizance of the action by the federal government, in behalf of Japanese school children in San Francisco, today introduced a resolution in the senate authorizing the attorney-general to take action to protect the interests of the state in all actions now pending. Referred to judiciary committee.

TO SETTLE STRIKE

The Poor Mules Will at Least Get Some Fresh Air.

Nevada, Cal., Jan. 18.—Labor Commissioner Stafford is here holding a conference of operators, in hopes of settling the miners' strike. If the miners' demand is not met by tomorrow the union will call out all the surface men, and the mines will fill with water. The companies are taking out the mules and preparing for a long siege. The miners say they are ready for a long lockout, and have plenty of money.

DEFEAT THE KAISER

Is the Battlecry of the People in Germany.

Berlin, Jan. 18.—An anonymous writer appeals today to the people to defeat the German Kaiser, to put their trust in elected representatives, and crush imperial rule at the election next week.

THE LUMBER TRUST

Will Be the Next in Order for an Investigation.

Washington, Jan. 18.—At the close of an eloquent speech the senate adopted the Kittridge resolution calling for an investigation of the lumber trust.

San Francisco, Jan. 18.—Siemens and Dabner were today sentenced to hang at a date to be set later.

The trend of events in certain quarters indicate that the time-honored principle of the freedom of the press will be sandwiched in with the weighty affairs of state in the senate Monday afternoon, on the reassembling of that body. The rights of the office-holding class to immunity from public criticism are going to be tested.

John W. Kelly, or rather the report that this gentleman printed in the Portland Telegram regarding the arrangement that was reached between the Haines supporters and the Democratic members of the senate, is the cause belli.

It will be remembered that when the vote for president of the senate was taken four Democrats changed their votes to Mr. Haines in quick succession, and made his election sure. It was generally understood that at least one of the other two members stood ready to vote for Haines had it been necessary.

Mr. Kelly sent his paper a story to the effect that a deal had been made between the supporters of Mr. Haines and the Democratic organization to the effect that the Democrats would help to elect Haines and in return should receive important committee appointments.

The Haines people deny this with great indignity, and on Mr. Kelly's refusal to retract the statement, asked the chief to have him removed from the duty of reporting the senate proceedings. It is now said on good authority that Mr. Haines and his supporters will attempt Monday to have Kelly ejected from the floor of the senate, or at any rate forbid him to report the proceedings of the body.

It is believed in newspaper circles that Mr. Kelly's paper will back him to the last ditch, and a pyrotechnical display of oratory is promised.

It is believed that the Hodson people will support Kelly, and if it comes to a vote, just what the Democrats will do is an enigma.

There was so much truth in the statement made by Mr. Kelly that the Democrats will not resent it, although some of them say that his statement was unauthorized. As a matter of cold fact and solid history, the Hodson people attempted to make a dicker with the Democrats, and on their failure to accomplish anything, the Haines people met the great terrified on the mart, and, while there was no definite bargain, it was understood that the Democrats were to fare well at the hands of President Haines.

Taking these things in view, and also the fact that Mr. Kelly is himself a Democrat, and one who has treated his own and other parties with fairness for many years, it is not believed that the six immortals will join in any attempt to have him ejected.
