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PEOPLE'S CHOICE NAMED BOURNE AND MULKEY ELECTED U. S. SENATORS BIG CODE GRAFT WINS OUT

BOURNE MULKEY ELECTED

Popular Choice of United States Senators
Is Ratified by Legislature

With a few demurring voices, both houses today, in special sessions, ratified the popular choice by electing Jonathan Bourne for the long term and Fred W. Mulkey for the short term to the United States senate.

The Senate Ratified.
The election of Fred W. Mulkey for the short term and Jonathan Bourne, Jr., for the long term in the United States senate was uneventful in the state senate at noon today. There were no nominating speeches and no nominations. The clerk read the totals of the vote cast last June, and the president stated that the vote would be taken on the election of Mr. Mulkey. Mr. Mulkey re-

ceived 27 votes, being the unanimous vote of all the senators present. Senators Hart, Mays and Miller of Linn were absent.

The five Democrats voted solidly for Mulkey, as they did for Bourne later on.

The election of Mr. Mulkey only occupied five minutes, and President Haines announced that the name of Jonathan Bourne, Jr., was before the senate. Booth of Lane, Laycock, Miller of Linn and Marion voted for Judge R. S. Bean of Lane county, and there were three absentees. All the others voted for Bourne. Senator Coshaw explained his vote. Coffey Would Have Political
Campaigns Without
Cream

Not to be crowded off the crest of the moral wave which is sweeping over the legislature, Representative Coffey of Multnomah would also inaugurate a reform in the manner of conducting political campaigns and elections, and will strive to eliminate entirely every semblance of boodling during the nominating and electing campaigns.

STUDYING STANDING COMMITTEES

Senate and House Fall Down Hard On
the Anti-Code Graft Fight.

Short sessions, frequent adjournments and delayed assembling has been characteristic of the legislature so far. The adjournment from Wednesday over to Monday afternoon was mainly to wait for printing the new state printer and secretary of state not having all in readiness for the two houses.

Both houses are in the throes of fighting the biennial free code graft, that costs the state \$7000 for the benefit of the Bancroft-Whitney Co. Public sentiment is not developing clearly as yet, and much interest is felt as to the composition of the standing committees, which are published today.

Speaker Davey's Committees.

The standing committees of the house are the result of compromises to capture the organization, as is always the case. Marion county gets two chairmanships, buildings and grounds and horticulture. Rodgers gets the second place on ways and means, and representatives of two big state colleges in Lane and Benton go on that committee. That means liberal appropriations for

higher education. The committee on railways is given to Mr. Davey's leading backer in Multnomah county, Mr. Driscoll, and Jones of Lincoln gets second place. That means that a demurrage law will have right of way, as Mr. Jones was the champion of the Texas car shortage bill in the special session of 1904. The committee on alcoholic traffic has been given to the "dry" sections of the state.

President Haines' Committees.

The presidency of the senate going to an outside county, the Marion county delegation fared better there. Senator Smith gets chairman of ways and means, Kay gets resolutions and enrolled bills, and F. J. Miller counties. The railroad committee of the senate is pretty strongly anti-corporation, and the committee on banking goes to Senator Coke. Bowerman gets the important committees on state and county officials and revision of laws. The judiciary committee of the senate is especially able with Malarkey chairman, and the others, Bowerman, Hart, Coke, Coshaw.

while he was not directly under the present law, he felt morally obliged to act in accordance with its provisions, and therefore he voted for Bourne. That gave Mr. Bourne 23 votes.

House Ratifies Also.

The solid vote of the house was cast for Frederick W. Mulkey for the short term to fill the vacancy, and Jonathan Bourne, Jr., was the choice of the majority for the long term by a vote of 57; two for Justice F. A. Moore of the supreme court, and one for Frederick W. Mulkey. Reynolds and Rodgers of Marion voted for Judge Moore, and Settlemier of Marion for Mulkey.

As the names were called in alphabetical order all voted for Mr. Bourne until the name of Reynolds was reached, when he arose and said that he had not taken statement No. 1, was not personally in favor of Mr. Bourne, and believed he was voicing the sentiment of his constituency by casting his vote for Judge Moore.

Mr. Rodgers came next and he, too, explained his position by saying that he did not take statement No. 1, and that he felt perfectly at liberty in expressing his sentiments. He said:

"I do not and never did favor Jonathan Bourne, and so stated in the campaign tour, and also wrote letters reiterating my stand on this question. Mr. Bourne is not my choice, and notwithstanding the vote he received at the hands of the people, I do not feel called upon to vote for him. I do not want to be understood as standing in the way of progress of legislation, nor to appear in the light of a crank or obstructionist, neither do I believe, nor wish to be understood as believing, that all of those who did take statement No. 1 were not sincere and absolutely honest in their purpose, and I honor them for the stand they took."

After calling attention to the fact that he stood high in the esteem and confidence of his constituency, as reflected by the overwhelming

punished by a fine of not less than \$5000 or imprisonment for not to exceed five years, while the latter is subject to a fine of not more than \$2000 or two years' imprisonment.

Any person who receives a gift, valuable consideration, office, employment or other gratuity for his vote also comes in for his share of punishment to the tune of \$2000 fine or two years' imprisonment, and deprived of his right of suffrage for five years besides.

Punishment is also provided for the candidate who is caught spending more money than the law allows.

The senate took two adjournments of 45 minutes each during the forenoon. This was done in order to give the committee on resolutions time to report. The committee rejected concurrent resolution No. 6, providing for a committee to look into pilotage conditions, but in a subsequent resolution, which was adopted, this duty was imposed on the committee on fisheries in the Columbia river.

In separate session the two houses of the legislature today re-elected Shelby M. Cullom to the United States senate.

Schools for Japs.

Sacramento, Jan. 21.—Senator Keane, of San Francisco, today introduced a resolution specifically providing that Japanese children be provided with separate schools, together with the children of the Chinese, Indian and Korean races. The measure is intended to fortify the position of the board of education in the test case now in the courts. Keane asked early consideration.

ELECT TO RETAIN CODES.

House Members Will Take Home All That Is Coming to Them.

By a vote of 57 to 14 the house this morning voiced its almost unanimous sentiment in favor of taking all that was coming to it in the line of supplies, etc., when it voted down Rodgers' of Marion resolution providing that the codes issued the members remain the property of the state, and be left in the custody of the sergeant at arms upon adjournment.

When the adverse report of the resolution committee was read upon the resolution Mr. Rodgers explained that he introduced the resolution at the request of the secretary of state, who has had them carefully annotated for the benefit of future legislatures, and that they should be returned to the state. He was supported by Mr. Farrell of Multnomah county, but opposed by Chairman Campbell, of the committee, and McCue of Clatsop and others, and upon an aye and nay vote the resolution was lost by a vote of 46 ayes to 14 nays.
