

HOUSE GRINDS GRIST

Joint Investigating Committees All Turned Down

All Of Governors Vetoes Sustained But One

The only business of importance transacted by the house yesterday afternoon was the action taken upon the governor's veto of house bills of the last legislature, all of which, with the exception of the act to regulate the sale, branding and analysis of fertilizers, was sustained by viva voce vote upon motion to suspend further action indefinitely.

The next in point of importance was the announcement of the standing committees by Speaker Davey, which took place about 3:30 in the afternoon, and adjournment was taken until 10 o'clock this morning.

Sixty-three new bills were also introduced and read for the first time. The routine business of the house follows:

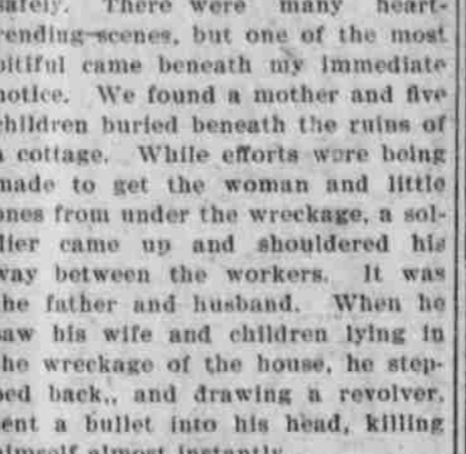

Tales of Suffering at Kingston, Philadelphia, Jan. 21. — The United Fruit Company's steamer Admiral Farragut arrived here today from Port Antonio with three passengers aboard who were in Kingston at the time of the earthquake. The three were Mrs. Albert Turner and Miss Grace B. Turner, of Pasale, N. J., and Edward W. Longley, of Newtonville, Mass. They were guests at a hotel which was partially destroyed but none of the three was hurt, but Miss Turner was cut by the falling debris. Miss Turner, who is a member of the Red Cross society, said: "Men, women and children were buried under the falling debris every where, and the cries of the wounded could be heard through the streets. When the shocks came and the hotel walls began tumbling we got out safely. There were many heart-rending scenes, but one of the most pitiful came beneath my immediate notice. We found a mother and five children buried beneath the ruins of a cottage. While efforts were being made to get the woman and little ones from under the wreckage, a soldier came up and shouldered his way between the workers. It was the father and husband. When he saw his wife and children lying in the wreckage of the house, he stepped back, and drawing a revolver, sent a bullet into his head, killing himself almost instantly.

Edward Longley said of the earthquake: "I had just returned to the Hotel Royal when there was a shock and the earth began to shake. Plaster began falling from the walls and ceiling, and as I fled I was nearly thrown to the ground by the terrible swaying. The heaviest loss of life was along the harbor districts, where buildings three and four stories high fell like eggshells."
