LONE STAR
DEMOCRAT
OF HOUSE

The lower branch of the legislature, which is absolutely Republican (all but one-sixtieth part) has gone on record as sacrificing itself on the altar of Democracy, to the extent of listening to the oratorical soundings of the peerless leader, William Jennings Bryan, but it does object most strenuously to "recognizing him as a man of sterling worth, of patriotic impulses and one of the most distinguished private citizens."

This was evidenced by the fact that the concurrent resolution introduced by "Baron" Rothchild, the "lone star of Democracy," in the house of representatives, inviting Bryan to address the joint assembly on the morning of January 24, and providing for a joint committee on reception, was reported back by the committee on resolutions with the recommendation that it be adopted amended by cutting off the preamble setting forth these saintly virtues of the Nebraska statesman. When the senate resolution, to the same effect, came over for the house concurrence, it was referred to the resolutions committee, and will be held up there pending the action of the senate upon the amended house resolution.

"Baron" Rothchild explained he could not prevent a condition of this kind, because, under the old Jewish doctrine, he could not hold a caucus, because it required not less than 10 of his faith to take effective action or hold a caucus upon anything, so the minority must remain in this helpless condition until some relief is offered. He also went on record, which is a new precedent established for Democracy, of voting to pass a bill over the governor's veto, when

he voted in favor of the passage of the act to regulate the sale, analysis and branding of fertilizers, which passed unanimously over the executive's veto.

"Well," said Mr. Rothchild, when asked to explain his action in this matter, "even a governor and a good Democrat may disagree."
