Haines, Alaska, Jan. 21.—Heroic work by the soldiers of the Tenth U. S. Infantry, from Fort William H. Seward, saved this city from total destruction by fire this morning. One soldier was burned to death. The property loss is \$20,000.

HEADLINES NOT LIBEL.

If Body of the Article Explains the Subject Fully.

Little Rock, Jan. 21.—The supreme court today decided that newspaper headlines, being merely an index to an item, are not libelous, if it is apparent the libel is explained in the body of the article. Editor Miller, of the Argonia Daily News, was indicted for libel of Attorney-General Rogers. The headlines read, "Both Rogers Offers Bribe, Then Commits Forgery." The lower court said it was libel.

PROBING THE MERGER

Using Earnings of Road to Buy Up Others.

Seattle, Jan. 21.—Benjamin Campbell, of St. Paul, general traffic manager of the Great Northern, testified at the entire morning session of the interstate commission investigation as to the effects of the Harriman merger of the Union Pacific and Northern Pacific railroads, the case being conducted by Commissioner Lane, of California. Campbell was general manager of the Oregon railroad & Navigation Company when the Union Pacific bought a controlling interest in the Southern Pacific, completing the Harriman merger. He was searchingly questioned by C. A. Severance, attorney for the commission. In an effort to establish the contention that competition on seaboard shipments ceased when the merger was completed, Campbell admitted that some time prior to the merger the Southern Pacific was making competitive rates into Portland, and after the merger the rates of the two lines were the same.

SENATORS AT WAR.

Carmack and Tillman Almost Come to Blows.

Washington, Jan. 21.—The doors of the United States senate were closed this afternoon on a motion of Teller to prevent a feared personal encounter between Carmack and Tillman. Carmack charged that Tillman ridiculed him without provocation. Adverting to Tillman's reference to Carmack's defeat for re-election Carmack said: "The fact was so obvious and so easily within the groveling intellect of the senator from South Carolina that he did not need to raise his belly from the dust to grasp it." The two men were standing close to each other and getting excited when the doors were closed.

RAILROAD COMMISSION

Is the Bone of Contention in Washington.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 21.—Not satisfied with forcing the resignation of Railroad Commissioner McMillan, the legislature may be asked to investigate the entire affairs of the office, as well as several other appointees of Governor Mead. The senate will urge the passage of a law making the commission elective, instead of appointive, and amend to cover electric as well as steam roads.

No Notice of a Fool.

Washington, Jan. 21.—It is officially announced that the American government will not ask England to punish Governor Sweetenham, of Jamaica, for ordering the American troops to leave the island of Jamaica.

To Prohibit the Sack.

Washington, Jan. 21.—The house today passed the Tillman bill prohibiting national banks from contributing to any elections, and all corporations from contributing to federal elections.

Conditions at Kingston.

Kingston, Jan. 21.—It is now known that the dead number 600, although many are yet uncovered from the debris. It is likely they will reach 100. Port Royal has been evacuated by the military and civilians. Indignation over Swettenham's action grows. The city is growing calmer. Overworked officials, committees and surgeons are restoring order, but would have done so more satisfactorily if the aid which the American seamen gave had been continued.

Ice Gorge on Columbia.

Hoover, Wash., Jan. 21.—A terrible ice gorge is sweeping down the Columbia. It swept away the Malta Hoover, a local steamer and ferryboat at Eleanor several miles downstream, and lodged them against an island. The ferry is lost at Umatilla rapids. The ice is 20 feet high from bank to bank. It extends many miles and is growing in size every hour.
