TAX EXEMPTION FOR FAMILY PEW.

Seats in Houses of Worship May Now Be Seized by Sheriff.

Representative Burns, of Multnomah county, dealt a body-blow to present-day, designing Shylocks who are living in hopes of basking under the sheltering cloak of religion by usurous methods, when he introduced a bill into the house yesterday afternoon exempting "the seat or pew occupied by a householder or his family in any place of public worship" from execution of judgment.

This, however, is only one of many items of personal property in his measure which has for its prime object the substitution of a law for the old statute which was knocked into smithereens by an opinion of the supreme court last fall in the case of Wallace vs. Fallin, et al., from Josephine county. Among the list of exemptions are the following:

Books, pictures and musical instruments to the value of \$75; wearing apparel, \$100, and \$50 each for every member of the householder's family; tools, apparatus, team, vehicle, harness or library, necessary to carry on his trade, occupation or profession to the value of \$400; together with sufficient food to support his team for 60 days; ten head of sheep with one year's fleece or the yarn or cloth manufactured from same; two cows, five swine; household goods, furniture and utensils to the value of \$300, and food sufficient to support said stock for three

months and his family for six months.

According to the punctuation of the contents of the bill all, or nearly all of the items enumerated would be exempt to the value stipulated, respectively, which, in the aggregate, would amount to hundreds of dollars.

BRYAN COMING TONIGHT

Will Speak in Opera House This Evening and Before Legislature Tomorrow.

William Jennings Bryan will make an address tonight at the Grand Opera House beginning at 8 o'clock. This will be his political speech. Thursday morning at 9 o'clock he will make a ten-minute talk to the students of the high school and following that will speak for a few minutes to the students of Willamette University, and will be at the state house at 10 o'clock and will address the two houses of the legislature in the hall of the house of representatives. He and Mrs. Bryan will then leave for the south on the 11 o'clock train.

Mr. and Mrs. Bryan will arrive in Salem this evening at 6:30 o'clock and will be met at the station by a committee composed of Dr. W. H. Byrd, F. W. Steusloff, John Bayne, W. H. Holmes and committees from the senate and house of representatives. Speaker Davey has appointed on this committee Herman Rothchild, Wilbur K. Newell and F. M. Brown. President Haines will appoint the senate committee today.

Governor Chamberlain will introduce Mr. Bryan tonight; members of the Bryan Club of Willamette University will act as ushers, and Oregon's sweetest singer, Mrs. Hallie Parrish-Hinges, will sing.

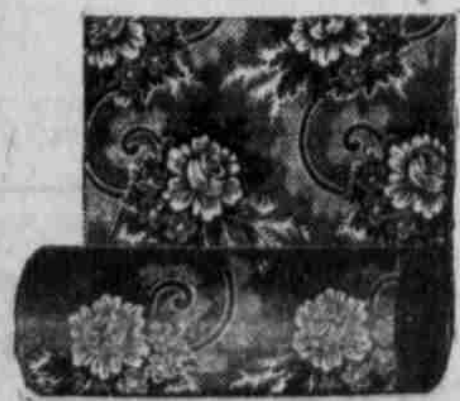
