The cell. The only emotion shown was by the countess herself.

Harry Thaw received her with open arms, and as she put her head on his shoulder in a sisterly embrace, a restrained sob all but shook her frame. Thaw, meantime, displayed only little feeling, evidently having prepared himself in advance to meet the curious eyes of the outsiders present.

After a few whispered words, the countess again kissed her brother and hurriedly withdrew to her carriage. She refused to say what had passed between her brother and herself, simply passing the meeting over with the expression:

"We just said, hello."

Appearance of Prisoner.

New York, Jan. 23.—The prisoner remained in the jury room during the roll call of the talesmen. When it was completed Jerome moved that Thaw be arraigned for trial on the charge of murder. Judge Fitzgerald cautioned the spectators against any outburst or noise. The clerk called Harry K. Thaw to the bar. Thaw, pale and nervous, walked quickly to his seat. He nodded smilingly to his relatives. He wore a dark blue suit and a great brown ulster, which he threw over his shoulders after he was seated a few minutes. He exerted a great effort to retain his self-control.

The Women in the Case.

Shortly after 10 o'clock Mrs. William Thaw, Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, the Countess of Yarmonth, Mrs. Geo. Carnegie and May McKensie were escorted by Edward Thaw and Geo. Carnegie to their designated seats.

Charles Dryden, an engineer, was the first talesman called. He was indicted on the ground that he had a biased opinion, which Jerome thought would not permit an impartial consideration of the evidence.

The Unwritten Law.

New York, Jan. 23.—After close examination Dryden was pre-emptorily challenged. During the examination of Dryden Jerome made refer-

ence to the "unwritten law." He asked the talesman if he would allow such a law to enter into his judgment. Thaw's counsel objected to the question. Dryden said he would be guided by the direction of the court in law points. Deming B. Smith was accepted and sworn, after a short examination. Smith is a retired manufacturer. Thaw was ordered to stand while Smith was being sworn. Smith was then declared foreman of the jury. Frank P. Hall, a painter, was the second juror selected. At 12 o'clock adjournment was taken until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

A number of the jury panel are absent, and were fined \$100.

WITHOUT FUSS OR ORATORY

Joint Assembly of Legislature Elects Bourne and Mulkey

Amid the quietest scenes that have ever prevailed upon a similar occasion in the history of Oregon legislation the election of Jonathan Bourne, Jr., United States senator for the long term and Frederick W. Mulkey for the short term, to succeed Senator John H. Mitchell was ratified by the joint assembly of the legislature at high noon today.

The proceedings were almost entirely devoid of demonstrations, at the conclusion of which both branches adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Both branches convened in joint assembly at 12 o'clock, noon, after the canvass of the vote of the separate houses was completed, showing Mr. Mulkey had received the unanimous vote; Bourne, 80; Justice Bean, 4; Justice Moore, 2; Frederick Mulkey 1; three senators absent.

President Haines declared Mrs. Mulkey elected United States senator for the short term ending March 4, 1907, and Jonathan Bourne, Jr., elected United States senator for the long term, beginning March 4, 1907.

Upon motion of Senator Hodson, President Haines appointed Senators Hodson and Coke and Representative Boyer, Pike and Sattlemier a committee to go into the hall and escort either or both of the successful candidates into the assembly.

The committee retired and soon returned as the escort of Senator Mulkey, who advanced to the speaker's desk, amid a ripple

of applause and, upon being introduced by President Haines, said:

"I have observed many anxious scenes in these legislative halls, protracted elections; failure to elect ambitions shattered; harmonious elections, aspirations realized and personal triumphs attained. Some of these things have met with my approval, others I have condemned, of all none so well meets with my complete accord as the great honor you have just conferred upon me. With a heart full of feeling and gratitude, appreciating the responsibilities of the position and expressing the hope that I may serve the commonwealth as United States senator with efficiency and dignity, I extend to you, and to the people of Oregon, my profound thanks.

"In any but a personal sense the election is of but little moment; the manner in which the election was brought about, however, is of importance. Oregon, under its primary election law, and the provisions of statement No. 1 of that law, has elected a United States senator by popular vote, and without constitutional modifications. It must be the concern of all of us that the people of this state and their representatives in the legislature never recede from this advanced position. When the other states of the Union follow Oregon's lead the effect upon national legislation will be instant and beneficial."

A message from United States Senator-elect Jonathan Bourne, Jr., who is in Washington, D. C., was then read before the joint assembly.

The text of Senator Bourne's message follows:

"To you, and through you, to the honorable members of the Oregon legislature permit me to herewith express my sincere thanks for the legislative ratification and formal election of Senator Mulkey and myself as the people's selection for United States senators for the short and long terms, respectively, as assigned in Oregon's last general election. Without egotism and without aggrandizement I congratulate you and the people of Oregon, for having fairly tried out to a conclusion our direct primary law, thereby having evolved a plan in the adoption of which the people of all the states of the Union, may, in common with our own, select and, in effect, directly elect their United States senators without violation or amendment of the federal constitution. While I am grateful to the legislature for the promptness and practical unanimity with which it has finally conferred upon me the great honor of a seat in the United States senate, in compliance with the expressed will of the sovereign people of Oregon, I am so mindful of the fact that the office is a high public trust committed to my hands as a public servant upon whom devolves the duty of rendering due equivalent for the confidence placed in me by my fellow citizens, and now, as before my election, I am my promise and my determination to serve the people of our state and our country to the full measure of whatever ability I may possess with becoming dignity. I desire to thank you on behalf of the law and for myself. Respectfully yours,
