RAISE IN DEPUTY SALARIES

Divers Measures of Interest to the General Public Before the Legislature

Representative Beals, of Tillamook county, has introduced a bill before the house, regulating the salaries of the district attorney and his deputies, in the third judicial district, which provides for an increase in the annual salaries of the deputy district attorney for Tillamook county from \$200 to \$400, and that of Polk county from \$250 to \$400. Otherwise the law as it now stands on the statutes remains untouched, with District Attorney McNary's salary fixed at \$2500 per annum and his deputies for Marion and Lincoln counties at \$600 per annum, and his Yamhill county deputy at \$400.

Of Interest to Trainers.

Representative Vawter, of Douglas and Jackson, has presented a measure, in house bill No. 217, which is designed for the protection of the lives of trainmen from low-hanging electric wires. It provides that all wire strung across railroads shall be not less than 20 feet above the rails, and any violation of this provision is subject to a fine of \$100 for each separate offense.

Bad News for Pests.

Representative Knowles, of Wasco, asks for a special levy of 2-10 mills, to apply to every county in the state, to make up a bounty fund from which he would have a bounty paid of \$2 for the scalps of coyotes, wild cats, cougars and mountain lions, but Representative Carter, of Benton, goes him one better by placing a bounty of \$10 each upon cougars, timber or gray wolves and \$5 each for every wild cat that is sent to the "happy hunting ground."

Defrondes City Councils.

Representative McCue, of Clatsop,

has presented a bill the purpose of which is to extend the privileges and powers of the initiative and referendum clause of the constitution to cities and towns. The measure sets out in detail how all questions of public interest may be submitted to popular vote of the municipality in the same manner as prescribed by the provisions governing similar elections upon matters of state.

Osteopaths Have Floor.

Representative Wilson, of Multnomah, introduced a bill before the house yesterday afternoon, defining osteopathy, providing for a state board of osteopathic examiners and registration, consisting of five members, to be appointed by the governor from a list of ten eligibles, submitted and recommended by the State Osteopathic Association. All applicants for permission to practice osteopathy in the state must pay a fee of \$10, show his credentials and pass a satisfactory examination before the board. These fees are retained by the board, and held in custody by the treasurer and kept as a revolving fund from which all salaries and expenses of the members and secretary of the board, all of which are to be fixed and regulated by the board, but the salaries of none of the members or the secretary, however, are to exceed \$10 per day and railroad and traveling expenses.

Money for Ashland Normal.

Representative Vawter, of Douglas and Jackson, Perkins and Kuhl, of Jackson, have introduced a bill asking for an appropriation of \$40,000 for the support and maintenance of the Ashland or Southern Oregon Normal school, and an additional appropriation of \$10,000 for the erection of a dormitory and the installation of a heating plant therein.

Want Their Money Back.

Through the medium of Representative Merryman of Crook, Grant, Klamath and Lake counties, the Klamath Water Users' Association asks the legislature to reimburse the organization for money paid into the corporation department for organization and annual corporation tax fees aggregating \$469.25. In a resolution which is a sort of preamble to the bill the association sets forth that it has not organized for gain, but simply to assist in the adjudication of the rights of the members, all settlers in the Klamath basin, which is being reclaimed by the government at a cost of \$4,400,000, and it asks to be reimbursed for \$146.25 organization fee, and \$323 in annual corporation taxes.

Make Them Carry Freight.

The "all log and timber railroads located and operated under the provision of sections 4972 and 4973 of the code shall be deemed public highways and common carriers and shall charge for such transportation such rates as other railroads are wont to charge" is the title and purpose of a bill which Representative Council, of Columbia county, has introduced before the house.

NO FAIR SHOOTING UP TOWNS

Mr. Knowlers, of Wasco, Say it is Naughty and Must Be Stopped

There will be no more reckless "shooting up the town," or at least it will become a somewhat more risky luxury or indulgence in future if the bill which Representative Knowles, of Wasco, is piloted successfully through the dangerous and uncertain channels of legislation and drops anchor safe and sound in a friendly port.

Mr. Knowles' measure, as indicated by its title, is intended to "prevent the reckless use of firearms in any town, village or community" or any place else where there is danger to life and injury to property. It provides penalties for violation of its provisions ranging in fines of from \$25 to \$500, or imprisonment in the county jail or penitentiary, or both. Mr. Knowles has introduced another bill making it a misdemeanor for violent, drunkenness or the use of obscene, profane and abusive language in any unincorporated town or village in the state.

the hands of Bryan, when he took especial pains to commend those Democratic senators who had upheld the choice of the people in voting for United States senators. Miller dodged the vote, and has had considerable roasting from political leaders. In very plain words that brought applause Bryan referred to the election of senators by the direct vote of the people, and congratulated Oregon for adopting that plan. He thanked the Democratic members for voting for Republicans, when the people had elected them.

Miller was not fazed by this, however, as he is state senator, regent of the State University and state textbook commissioner all at once. Mr. Bryan was probably not aware that he was marring the paint on the face of one of his worshippers, when he upheld the Democrats who respected the greatest reform that has ever been accomplished.

At the High School.

Mr. Bryan was escorted to the high school at 9 o'clock and took his place on the platform in company with Professor Powers, Principal Mariette, Directors Byrd and Epley, D. J. Fry, Judge Halley and Governor Chamberlain. Professor Mariette introduced Governor Chamberlain, who in turn introduced the speaker.

He concluded his high school address by saying that whatever may be a person's education, unless his heart was right, that person was a failure. A shriveled heart will ruin an educated brain.

At the conclusion of the speech a beautiful bunch of flowers was given Mr. Bryan, and the students made the assembly hall ring with enthusiastic yells.

To Willamette Students.

Mr. Bryan was then driven to Willamette University, where the party was met by President Coleman, who greeted Mr. Bryan warmly and thanked him for coming. The chapel was crowded with the teachers, students and friends of the University, and as he entered Professor Jensen played a selection on the chapel organ.

President Coleman presided and said he felt honored by the presence of Mr. Bryan and also of the governor. He introduced the governor, who, in a very few words, presented the orator of the occasion.

Mr. Bryan spoke for 20 minutes, and his address was pronounced by many to be his most splendid effort. He first spoke to the student on the art of public speaking, and advised distinctiveness of thought and words.

He reminded the students of their debt to society, and said that output is greater than income, and that a man is great not for what he gets out of the world, but for what he puts in it.

The whole school united in singing "America" at the close of the speech.

The State House Speech.

Mr. Bryan and party then went to the state house, and a reception of ten minutes was given at the governor's office. Many citizens were introduced and the house of representatives was densely packed with people. Chairs were provided for the senate, and the state officers were given room on the rostrum.

President Haines, of the senate, introduced the speaker. Mr. Bryan thanked the legislature for the invitation to speak and said he would talk no party politics. He merely offered suggestions for legislative work.

He hoped the time will soon come when the officer who goes back on the platform on which he is elected will be whipped from public life just as is the embezzler.

He said the weakness in our government did not lie in the people, but in their representatives.

He advocated the initiative and referendum as bringing the government closer to the people, and said if there were no corporations in this state legislation would be easy.

He laid it down as a fundamental principle that the creature cannot be greater than the creator, and advised to put this motto at the head of every franchise: "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth."

He advocated short-term franchises, and believed that a city should have the right to take over franchises at will.

At the close of the address on motion of Representative Campbell, of Clackamas, the joint assembly gave Mr. Bryan a vote of thanks.
