GOLDEN NUGGETS FOR SALLOW PEOPLE

NO NOISES ALLOWED ON SUNDAY

Rep. Gray, of Douglas, Would Almost Prohibit Snoring Upon That Day

If the Sunday closing bill offered by Newell, of Washington, is to be considered strict, that which was presented for the consideration of the house yesterday afternoon by Gray, of Douglas, can be classified as extremely radical. It not only applies to the closing of all theatres on the Sabbath day, but it seeks to put an end to baseball, football, races, merry-go-rounds; will not even permit railroad or transportation companies to conduct Sunday excursions either by train, cars or boat, except upon their regular schedules, nor allow cigar or news stands to sell cigars or tobacco of any kind, stationery, confectionery or anything else, except to deliver and sell the daily newspapers.

This is the first real blue law that has put in its appearance before the legislature, and its provisions are so drastic that one will hardly dare to make the slightest noise on Sunday without danger of being jerked up before a justice of the peace and held to account. The enforcement of the provisions of this law is delegated to the district attorneys, sheriffs, constables, marshals or chief of police, or any other peace officer. In case of negligence on the part of any of these officials it is the bounden duty of the district to prosecute them to the full extent of the law, and he, too, comes under the ban to the extent that, in case complaint is entered against him, as the public prosecutor for dereliction in his duty, it devolves upon the circuit court to designate another attorney to prosecute the prosecutor.

BARRETT PROPOSES A CHANGE

Would Relieve Sheriffs of Duties of Tax Collector and Impose Upon Treasurers

If the committee on assessment and taxation, or some other authority does not submit a measure covering the point in the meantime Representative Barrett, of Multnomah, has in contemplation the drafting of a bill transferring the duties of tax collector from the sheriffs of the different counties to the treasurers.

While Mr. Barrett will make his proposed law general in its effect he anticipates that there may be some counties which prefer the present system of having the sheriff collect the taxes, and in these cases he will be perfectly willing to make exceptions of them. Multnomah county, for instance, would probably be one of these cases where the county treasurer does not care to be burdened with the duty and responsibility.

Mr. Barrett, however, thinks the work could be facilitated and simplified to a considerable degree if the change were to be made, since it would do away with the double checking of the receipts, have a tendency to reduce the required amount of bonds now exacted from the sheriffs, \$50,000, and the only difference it would make would be to deprive him of some little patronage, in the lack of necessity for employment of extra deputies.

Widows Secure a Victory.

The second bill to have run the gauntlet of the first stages of legislation only to meet with ignoble defeat, was house bill No. 30, by Jackson, which had for its purpose the amending of section 1180 so as to provide for the sale and conveyance of decedents' property notwithstanding the dower right of the widow. The predominance of sentiment was in favor of protecting the widow after the death of the husband, and the house voiced its disapproval of legislation to the contrary by a negative vote of 45 to 14 in the affirmative.

Representative McCue, of Clatsop, demonstrated to the satisfaction of the house, without so stating, that he was not a lawyer, when, during the discussion upon Jackson's "anti-widow's dower" bill, he stumbled and fell over the pronunciation of the word "executrix," insisting upon putting the accent upon the syllable "cu" until he finally gave it up in despair.

This discussion also brought out the unqualified declaration from Representative Farrell, of Multnomah, that he was in "favor of the widow" and was opposed to the bill on general principles.

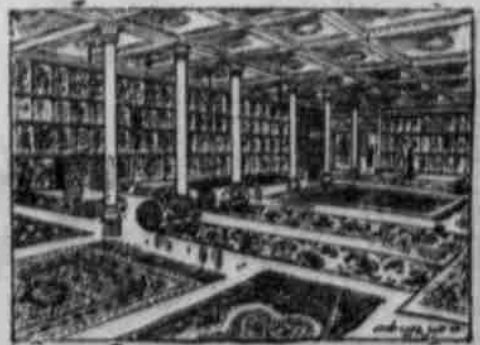
