 will the relief come that will make more radical reforms unnecessary. (Applause.)
 Stand by the side of a stream and watch the current flow by and it does no harm; you can even listen to the singing of its waters, but put a dam across the stream and the waters begin to rise behind the dam; the dam higher and the waters still higher, and after while there is a force in that panned up water that will wash away any dam made by human hands; if you go too far when the dam is washed away some houses in the valley beneath, below the dam, may go to the dam.
 But whose fault is it? It is the fault of the man who builds the dam, not the fault of the man who tears it out. There is a current of public opinion; there is a stream of progress; let that current have its way; let that reform will come when it needs for it arises, but dam that stream if you dare! The water rises behind it, and after while there will be a force so great that no dam can restrain it. In monarchies they let the water rise until the people in rebellion blow out the dam with shot and shell.
 In our country, where the people are free to act, they can remove the dam before it becomes too dangerous. Ten years ago we appealed to the people to stop the wrongs and remedy the abuse, but they would not listen; now they consider remedies that they did not think of then and that we did not discuss. (Applause.) I never discussed government ownership of railroads when I was a candidate, or even six years ago, but yet now a Republican President discusses it and uses it as a club to secure remedial legislation. I believe, my friends, the Democratic party will go out into the next campaign and call attention to the remedies it has proposed; that it will call attention to the vindication of those remedies and it will say to the people 'Are you ready

now? If you are ready, we will give you relief. If you are not ready, prepare for remedies more radical than those which you now reject.'"
