and president of the Jackson County bank, of Medford, who said that it was important that both bills be considered together and by one committee.

Mr. Barrett opposed the movement to take the bill out of the hands of the salaries and county officials committee for reasons of his own, which he did not state on the floor, but he afterward said that it was his opinion that the intent was to smother his measure in favor of Washburn's bill, which is drawn almost identical to his bill, except that it favors the loaning of the money out on personal securities, alleged to be in favor of the bank trust of Portland. When Mr. Barrett announced his opposition to the transfer Mr. Vawter voted against the motion and when it failed to carry and the Barrett bill was left in the original committee, Mr. Vawter moved to have the Washburn bill taken out of the hands of the banking committee and placed with the committee on salaries and county officials which was carried.

Mr. Barrett would not be interviewed upon the subject but admitted that he thought the move was a significant one, in that the Washburn bill was not presented until after his was before the house and that he believed he detected the scent of a well-laid job to either smother his measure outright or to amend it in such a manner as to kill its effects.

At 12:30 the house took a recess until 1:30, when, after a brief session and pursuant to a senate concurrent resolution adjournment was taken until 2 o'clock Monday.
