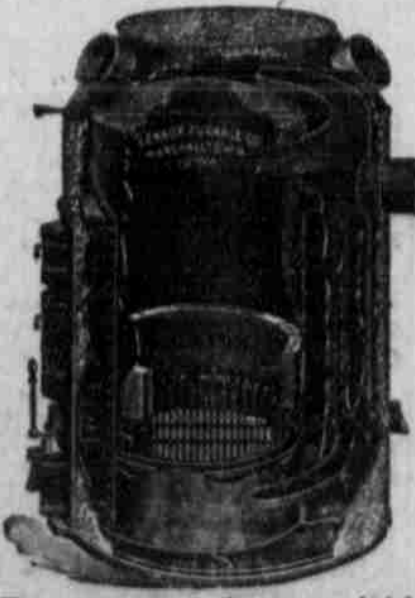

THE CAR SHORTAGE.

Probably Caused by an Insufficient Trackage on the Great Roads.

We do not think any intelligent person has ever supposed that the universal shortage of cars is caused by the deliberate conspiracy of carriers to impede and tie up business. Such talk is silly. It is caused by the lack of equipment sufficient to transact the business under existing conditions. There are not enough cars, nor is there motive power sufficient. The figures recently printed by the Chronicle show that the lack of equipment is due to the lack of plants sufficient to build and deliver it. All the plants are worked to their capacity and new plants are being constructed as fast as capital and labor can do it.

It is not certain that if there were cars enough and locomotives enough, the traffic could be moved much more rapidly. On some roads and for some traffic, doubtless it could. On other roads, or important stretches of road, the tracks now seem to be worked for all there is in them. More trains would simply mean more smash ups. In the opinion of J. J. Hill, who ought to know, the bottom of the trouble is too much single track, or too much double track where the traffic requires four tracks or more. With adequate trackage and locomotives they could probably, by exertion, be made to answer. The business of the country has grown faster than the facilities for transacting it. The only relief, apparently, must come from more tracks in addition to all the equipment which can be got. This means continuous investments in railroad property on an enormous scale for years to come. It means a demand for capital beyond the power of this country to provide. It means demands for material beyond the capacity of our steel plants. It means labor of all kinds in greater quantities than ever. Ultimately a country gets finished. Its resources become fully developed and equipment is provided for transacting all the business which that country can produce. England is comparatively a finished country. The United States is very far indeed from it. Its production in all lines is destined to increase very rapidly for many years to come, and every increase of production involves increase of equipment, not only in transportation and terminal facilities, but in more houses, city streets, office buildings, banks and whatever else enters into an adequate equipment for transacting the business of a continent. All that we can expect is that expectation of profit will urge every man to do his best to provide necessary facilities. Energetic men are probably doing that now. The rush of "moving the crops" will soon be over for this year. That will release some equipment. Cars and locomotives are building as fast as they can be built. There will be more equipment next year than now, but unless Providence visits us with short crops or a money panic we do not see how transportation facilities are to become adequate to the business of the country for some time to come.—S. F. Chronicle.
