STATE LAND AGENT

Recommends Leasing of Grazing Lands

Among the recommendations made by State Land Agent West, in his biennial report to the governor, is that, since the state has about 500,000 acres of school land in Eastern Oregon which is unfit for anything except grazing, the state advertise the lands for lease in the same manner the federal government leases its grazing lands. He says that they should be leased, subject to sale, and, in the event of an opportunity to sell, the unearned portion of the rental paid should be returned.

He also recommends that the records of the office should be gone over thoroughly from the date of its creation, in order to clear up bad titles, so the present occupants of the land will not be in constant fear of expulsion, and indemnity lands erroneously patented to the state may be validated by substituting new base.

He says there are about 9000 acres of lands which have been turned down by the government, on account of invalid base, upon which the state will have to reimburse innocent purchasers to the amount of about \$20,000. Through the creation of several new forest reserves the state has acquired about 60,000 acres of valid base, the price upon which the board has fixed at \$7.50 per acre until further notice, which would be ready saleable, but he has not the time to attend to indemnity selections properly, and asks for additional clerical assistance in order that he may get out and dispose of these lands for the benefit of the school fund.

RAILWAY HEARING.

Attorney Cotton Told of Washington Rates.

The committee room was crowded with interested spectators, composed of both private citizens and interested legislators, and the Oregon & Washington Lumber Manufacturers' Association, representing 197 mills, with a combined annual output of 1,300,000,000 feet, at \$17 per thousand, was represented by President Philip Buehmer, of Portland. The lumber men claim they have \$1,800,000 worth of lumber in orders not moved on account of car shortage, and \$2,700,000 of lumber value on the docks of the lumbermen, which, with interest at the rate of 5 per cent amounted to a loss of \$162,000 per year.

When reference was made to the Washington commission Mr. Cotton facetiously remarked that one of the members of the committee received a lower rate than the rest, and he resigned, and the governor was unable to find another to replace him, and when asked how he happened to get a lower rate, he laughingly remarked that the Northern Pacific gave it to him, "and the Northern Pacific is crooked."

The hearing lasted until nearly midnight, and held the interest of the spectators to a finish.

REVEREND LOSSNER DEAD

Rev. H. Lossner, of this city, died at his home last night, after an illness of a week. He suffered from heart failure for about a week, and passed away very peacefully, surrounded by his family and friends. He was 67 years old, having come to Salem to reside seven years ago, and having been engaged in the ministry for 46 years. He was pastor of the St. John Evangelical Lutheran church on Center street, which, with the parsonage, he built after he reached this city with his family. He leaves a wife and 11 children and 18 grandchildren to mourn his death. The funeral will be held Wednesday at the church. Burial at Portland. Deceased was a man of the greatest industry and public spirited in a high degree.

The banks are as follows: Grants Pass Savings Bank, of Grants Pass; Wasco County Bank, of The Dalles; Union Savings Bank, of Pendleton; Security Savings Bank, of Oregon City; Union Bank, of Al Grande; American Savings Bank, of Eugene, and the Coos County Bank, of Marshfield.

The Butte Boys Consolidated Mining Company, of Portland, filed articles of incorporation this morning in the office of the secretary of state, with C. W. Beaver, M. G. McCorkle, A. T. Lewis as incorporators; capital stock, \$1,000,000.
