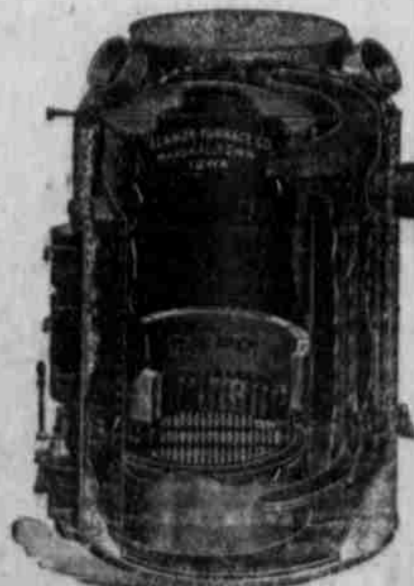

SENATE MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Considerable Routine Work Done in a Session of Two Hours.

After an adjournment of four days the senate held a session of two hours Monday afternoon and disposed of a considerable amount of routine business. At 4 o'clock the body adjourned to give the members an opportunity to attend committee meetings and every standing committee in the senate except the committee on railroads went into session.

A petition of Oregon and Washington Land association, was referred to the railroad committee.

A petition of Evening Star grange on the Oregon City locks was referred to the committee on commerce and navigation.

A petition on the Sunday law was referred to the committee on education.

A petition from the Ashland Fruit and Produce association was referred to the committee on railroads.

Senate concurrent resolution No. 15 was introduced by Bailey to the effect that all except appropriation bills be sent to the governor for approval or veto 6 days before adjournment.

Senate joint resolution No. 4, referring to the seat of government, was referred to the judiciary committee.

A message from the governor regarding lighting the public buildings was referred to committee on ways and means.

The committee on engrossed bills reported 6 bills engrossed.

The committee on enrolled bills reported S. B. No. 116 already enrolled.

The following bills were introduced and read for the first time.

S. B. No. 133, Laycock, to protect quail and pheasant in certain counties.

S. B. No. 134, Smith of Marion, to regulate normal schools.

S. B. No. 135, Coshov, to regulate land titles.

S. B. No. 136, Kay, to provide for binding and distribution of 480 of all public documents.

S. B. No. 137, Kay, to amend the law relating to mutual fire insurance companies.

S. B. No. 138, Bailey, to protect passenger on street railways.

S. B. No. 139, Bailey, to secure wages of mechanics and laborers when they are discharged.

S. B. No. 140, Hodson, to regulate the salary of the sheriff of Columbia county.

S. B. No. 141, Hodson, to regulate the salary of the assessor of Columbia county.

S. B. No. 142, Malarkey, to protect lines of public by limiting hours of labor for certain railroad employes.

S. B. No. 143, Malarkey, to amend law relating to settlement of estates.

Senate bill No. 52 was transferred from judiciary committee to committee on industries.

Senate bill No. 67 was transferred to railroad committee.

S. B. No. 47 was transferred to the judiciary committee.

The bill of Smith, of Marion, relating to normal schools was read second time and referred to committee on education. This matter went to a vote and 8 senators voted to go to ways and means committee against 11 to refer it to committee on education.

Senator Coshov's bill No. 135 was read second time and referred to committee on revision of laws.

Senate bills Nos. 68 to 132 inclusive were read the second time and referred to appropriate committees.

By unanimous consent of the senate, the following bills were introduced:

S. B. No. 144, Mullt, to amend the law relating to sawdust in streams.

S. B. No. 145, Coke, to provide for appointment of supreme court commissioners.

S. B. No. 145, Coke (by request), to prohibit nets and seines for salmon in certain places.

The following bills were read the third time:

S. B. No. 14, relating to estrays. The bill as amended was enacted by a vote of 20 to 1.

S. B. No. 20, to control delinquent children; enacted by a unanimous vote.

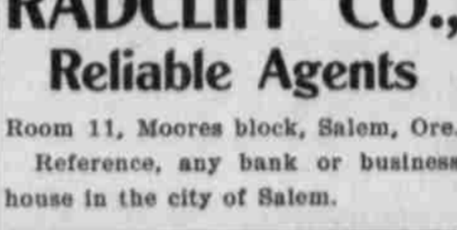
