### SENATE ROUTINE TUESDAY

Immediately after the senate convened, Tuesday afternoon, Senator Kay offered resolution No. 17, that only general bills be printed, except by request. The senate refused to suspend the rules and the resolution went to the committee on resolutions.

Committee on resolutions recommending petition to congress to increase pension of Indian War veterans, made report which was adopted, and the memorial was ordered made.

Senator Sichel introduced resolution that all bills amending code shall contain brief resume of subject matter in the title. Referred.

Committee on roads and highways recommended that S. B. No. 57, relating to work on roads do not pass. This calls for the repeal of the Tuttle road bill. Further consideration of the bill was indefinitely postponed.

Committee on medicine and pharmacy recommended that bill on optometry do pass. Adopted.

By unanimous consent Senator Wright moved that committee on ways and means report appropriation for two normal schools only. Referred.
