Fresh Fish for Canadian Cities.

Ottawa, Jan. 31.—The minister of marine and fisheries has taken practical measures for carrying into effect a scheme that has been under consideration for years past for the transport of fresh fish from the maritime provinces to the markets of Ontario and Quebec by means of cold storage. A vote of \$25,000 has been placed in the estimates to encourage the railway companies to establish the necessary cold storage service, and the Hon. J. Brodeur is now in communication with the railroad companies to secure the co-operation. The service will go into effect next summer, and will, it is hoped, fill a long-felt want in Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa and other interior centers for the fish of the eastern provinces.

Same Fight in Maine.

Portland, Me., Jan. 31.—There is a great fight on here to remove the state capitol to Portland. Out of 45 states 33 have the state capitol located away from their largest cities. The advantages to the state and the public from this policy of avoiding the great centers of population are under discussion, and Salem, Oregon, is referred to as an illustration of the desirability of not removing the capitol of Maine from this city.

House Passes Bills.

H. B. No. 214, Vawter, Kubli, Perkins, creating office of deputy county recorder in Jackson county, at salary of \$600 per annum. Passed.
H. B. 77, Farrell, relating to the adoption of children. Passed.
Two senate bills, Nos. 140 and 141, both by Senator Hodson, of Multnomah, passed through the process of legislation without going through the hands of the printer. No. 140 provides increase of salaries of the sheriff and deputy sheriff of Columbia county, and No. 141 increases the salary of the assessor of Columbia county from \$900 to \$1200 per year, and authorizes the employment of clerical aid at \$800 per year.

Russell Sage Estate.

New York, Jan. 31.—State Comptroller Glyn, at Albany, today received \$625,000, the amount due on the estate of Russell Sage, under the inheritance tax act. The value of the estate has been placed at \$60,000,000, but that is not the final estimate. This is the largest amount ever received, with three exceptions. In 1900 the state collected from the estate of George Smith, a wealthy English merchant, who died in New York City, \$1,934,753. In 1901, \$665,000 were received from the C. P. Huntington estate, and in 1904 the inheritance tax from the estate of Warren Smith, a prominent Westchester county carpet manufacturer, was \$953,348.

Pearl Fishing Good.

Washington, Jan. 31.—William H. Michael, United States consul at Calcutta, in a report, states that the pearl fishery at that port has been remarkably successful during the past season. The total revenue derived from the fishery and camp amounted to \$875,392 and expenditure \$73,510, the net profit was \$801,822, over \$11,000 in excess of that of 1904. Most of the pearls have been sent to this country, where they are in great demand.

Big Irrigation Work in Colorado.

Sterling, Colo., Jan. 31.—No less than 65,000 acres of land will be irrigated in this state in a short time. The land is lying adjacent to the Union Pacific tracks, from Hiff to Crook, and is exceedingly fine prairie land. It is proposed to get the water from Cedar and Pawnee creeks. This will be one of the largest irrigation enterprises ever undertaken in this country, but it is expected that its cost will not exceed \$1,500,000.

Confucian Schools.

Pekin, Jan. 31.—An imperial edict was issued and goes into effect today ordering adherence to the old methods of learning, and directing that suitable men be selected as teachers in the Confucian school of Chifu, where special attention is to be given to teaching the codes of ethics and moral doctrines of the great Chinese sage.
