Standard Oil Charges.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 31.—The trial of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, on the charge of receiving concessions on shipments of oil from Whiting, Indiana, as set forth in one of eight indictments recently sustained by Judge Landes of the United States district court, was set today for March 4th, after John G. Miller, attorney for the company, had entered a formal plea of not guilty on behalf of his clients to the first count of the indictments. There are no less than 1903 counts in the indictment, and Mr. Miller tried to have quashed all except the first count of each of the eight indictments against the company, thus reducing from \$35,000,000 to \$30,000 the possible maximum fine against his clients upon conviction. The motion to have these counts quashed was promptly overruled by Judge Landes, and Mr. Miller then declined to enter any plea upon the counts in question. The court ordered the clerk to enter a plea of not guilty.

SENATE ROUTINE THURSDAY

When the senate convened this morning at 11 o'clock a telegram was read from Olympia to the effect that the Washington legislature had passed the Piper bill, making an appropriation for the Seattle fair.

Six senate bills were read the second time and referred to their several committees.

When the third reading of bills was taken up S. B. 24 was laid over, owing to the absence of Senator Hart, the sponsor of the bill.

S. B. 62, Smith of Umatilla, appropriating money for the pendleton fair, was enacted.

S. B. 88, Bowerman, creating the Seventh District Agricultural Society, was passed.

S. B. 109, Bowerman, regulating pharmacists, was re-referred to the committee on medicine and pharmacy.

The property involved was stated in the complaint, consisting of sixteen tons of hay and 263 bushels of white oats valued at \$239.07.

Serviceable English Walking Hats.

Held in place by a single great rose is a popular method of placing the ostrich plume on fall hats.

For everyday wear there is a return to favor of the little English walking hat of soft felt simply trimmed with folds of ribbon around the long, narrow crown and stiff wings or a rosette on one side holding up the rim.

As a general thing, narrow and close fitting brims mark the street hat, the



felt brims being turned up at one side and faced with velvet, either plaited or plain. Two birds nestling their heads together in love bird fashion are put on, one inside and one outside the crown.

One thing to remember in the new millinery is that there is less bandeau—less up and down—and the one that is used reaches well around into the front of the hat.

Most attractive are the amber hatpins, buckles and necklaces. This golden colored substance, though, has to be worn with care, as there are few gowns on which it looks well.

JAPAN MAKING HEADWAY

Washington, Jan. 31.—Mr. Aeki had a conference with Secretary of State Root today, presumably reference to the pending negotiations. Taft authorizes the state that absolutely no information be given to the hands of the government of the Japanese in Hawaii are organized for a possible demonstration in this country.

San Francisco, Jan. 31.—The board of education went into a session this morning to prepare plans for a visit by President and Superintendent Ronconville Washington to confer with the student on Japanese exclusion. The members again expressed themselves as confident that the fight won, and are still determined to maintain the position the board taken.

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 31.—The senate this morning withdrew resolution requesting the California congressional delegation to urge the naturalization of the Japanese.

A Democratic senator introduced a resolution calling on the governor to appoint the attorney-general special counsel to go to Washington to present California's view of the Japanese question, but the Republicans opposed it. Immediately the convening of the legislature was postponed, in accordance with the request of the California delegation sent last night. The governor said that all legislative action on the Japanese question be deferred present.
