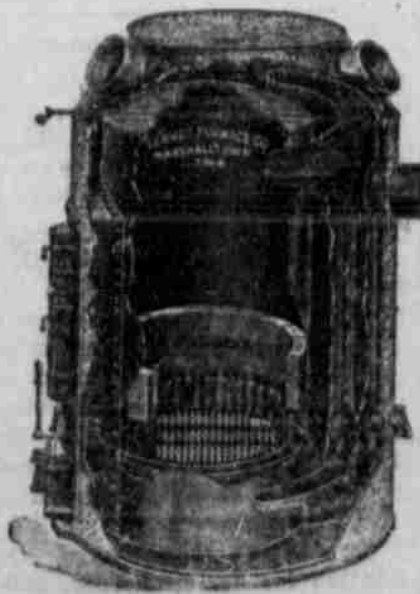

FEEBLE MINDED INSTITUTE

Arguments That Are Employed to Secure the Appropriation

A strong delegation, headed by G. W. Jones, superintendent of the state blind school, are working hard to secure the establishment of a home for the feeble minded and epileptics, that is to be located on lands already selected near this city.

Pamphlets and statistics are circulated among the members, and following is a copy of one of the statistical arguments employed to back up the bill introduced by Miller of Linn and Marion:

How Feeble Mindedness Grows.
The following figures were taken from the records in the office of the State Board of Charities of Indiana:
In 511 families in which there is feeble mindedness there are 1924 persons. Of these 1343 are in public institutions, 1249, or 65 per cent of all being feeble minded. Of the males 15.3 per cent are illegitimate. Twenty-two per cent of the females have given birth to illegitimate children.

Another group of 241 families has 970 members. Of these 221 families have two generations of feeble mindedness; 16 three generations; three, four, and one has five generations. The number of direct descendants who are known to be feeble minded is 726 or 74.8 per cent of all.

Nothing reproduces itself so surely as feeble mindedness.
Can Oregon afford to place no check upon it? If the state fails to give care and protection to this class it will certainly reap a class of paupers, feeble mindedness and crime.

SENATE THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Small Amount of Routine Matters Disposed of in Upper House.

The senate met yesterday at 2:30 o'clock and adopted a favorable report from the committee on printing on S. B. No. 136, relating to the printing of public documents.

The following new bill was introduced:

S. B. No. 167, Bingham, disposing of all lands accruing to the state.

The following engrossed bills was read for the third time:

S. B. No. 166, being a substitute for S. B. No. 82, creating Baker and Malheur counties into the fourth agricultural district; Grant into the fifth and Harney into the sixth. Enacted.

The following bills were read for the first time and went to the second reading: House bills, 75, 92, 100, 161, 77, 214, 274.

H. B. No. 273, to regulate the salary of the county judge of Washington county, was under a suspension of rules read the second and third times and enacted.

The following house bills were read the second time and referred: House bills, 75, 92, 100, 161, 77, 214.

Under a suspension of the rules H. B. No. 214, relating to the salary of the deputy recorder of Jackson county was placed on its final passage and enacted.

The third reading of house bills was taken up and the following read: H. B. No. 96, fixing the salary of the school superintendent of Umatilla. Carried.

A petition from numerous citizens of Jackson county, protesting against the enactment of the proposed water code, was read and referred to the committee on resolutions.

Senator Johnson, of Benton, stated that a special train would leave for the state agricultural college Friday at 1 o'clock and asked as many senators as could do so to accept the invitation to visit the school. On motion of Senator Miller, of Linn, the senate adopted a resolution accepting the invitation and saying it is the sense of the senate that as many members as can get away make the trip.

Senate concurrent resolution, Nottingham, providing for the distribution of the reports of the food and dairy commission, was referred.

Senator Caldwell offered S. R. No. 20 asking that the ways and means committee make an appropriation for a fair to be held in each county.

Senator Wheelon introduced S. J. R. No. 5, instructing the secretary of state to telegraph the thanks and appreciation of the state to Chairman Burton of the rivers and harbors committee in congress and to Congressman W. L. Jones, of Washington for their work in making the large appropriations for the opening of the Columbia and Snake rivers. Senator Wheelon asked for unanimous consent to take the resolution up and adopt it. Senator Booth objected and it went to the committee on resolutions.

It was decided that the senate adjourn at noon Friday until Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
