\$100,000 FOR SEATTLE FAIR.

Ways and Means Committee Cut Down Settlemier's Bill Fifty Thousand.

The joint ways and means committee held a session this afternoon and cut down the Settlemier bill to give the Seattle Fair \$150,000 to \$100,000 by a vote of five to three. Those voting for the whole amount were Rodgers, of Marion; Driscoll, of Portland, and Carter, of Benton.

The committee also had the insane asylum betterment and improvement matters up for consideration, and have practically decided to allow \$150,000 for betterments, repairs and other improvements and \$90,000 for the construction of a new wing, setting aside the proposition to establish a separate institution for female inmates at a cost of \$327,000. The committee is in session this afternoon.

The committee on banking will hold an open meeting in room No. 3 of the senate chamber tonight at 8 o'clock, when the state banking law will be taken up.
