UNDER THE BRAZEN DOME OF LEGISLATION.

County division bills are not in favor at this session. All have gone glimmering. A large delegation of Douglas county officials came up to Salem the other day and officiated at the obsequies of two attempts to steal little slices of juicy territory from old Douglas, that has already yielded material to make half a dozen counties. Coos people are very enterprising and wanted a few sections of especially fine timber land to add to their already almost immeasurable tracts. They don't really want the timber, but some of the millionaires down there, like Major Kinney and Dr. McCormick wanted the cougar that are playing on the sides of those mountains. But the Douglas men say they will not part with cougars nor timber, and by putting a few additional spokes in the wheels stopped it.

Then Lane, dear old Lane, that wants the earth, tried to swipe a few townships containing the rest of the Bohemia mining territory, but the Douglas home guard said not an inch. The Bohemia mines, it seems, lap over into Douglas, and are wanted by the Cottage Grove people to add to their choicest collection on earth. And there was some very fine deer hunting up there that State Game Warden Baker wishes to add to his home county shooting park. But the men from Douglas were ready to declare war to the knife, the long, keen, glittering, bloody knife of war, and having an anchor to windward, in the office of the secretary of state, they drew the spocard that turned the game their way, and Lane's long, nervy fingers that had reached out for the choicest mining townships in the Cascades relinquished their tension and the Bohemia mines dropped back into the custody of Douglas. The Douglas braves have gone home, and they may find a few of their townships gone to a less greedy neighbor anyhow some fine morning.

It is a nice thing to have held office and not to have heaped up new burdens on the people, or have eaten off your head, as cattle men say of some stock. One of the men who has retired from practical politics in Oregon with some considerable credit on this line is F. T. Wrightman, who, for 3 1/2 years, has conducted the corporation tax department. He is a Marlon county boy, and in 1898 advocated the creation of the corporation tax law and the inheritance tax. He was recognized as an authority on the subject and appointed to inaugurate the system. The ideas he advocated and recommended were enacted in 1903, and through his efforts the receipts from those departments were raised to a total of \$500,000. So that Mr. Wrightman has a right to conclude that he has made good, and more than paid for his keeping while in the employ of the state. He was a candidate for the office of secretary of state on the issue of extending direct taxation, and if he had been elected would have made a fight to abolish all direct state taxes. The state of affairs political was not ready for that step. The people must get a still bigger dose of direct taxes before they rebel and adopt so progressive a system as Wrightman advocated. He goes to Mexico, and is to be congratulated on his very clever official record.

Government Hay for Montana.

Virginia City, Mont., Feb. 12.—Owing to the threatened starvation of upwards of 20,000 head of cattle in the vicinity of Assiniboine, by reason of severe weather and need of hay, straw and grain, the secretary of war has announced that these commodities, in limited quantities, will be sold during the next three months, at actual cost to the United States. The stock to be disposed of will be that stored for the use of the garrison at Fort Assiniboine. There is a great scarcity of hay and grain in the state, and this, coupled with the fact that the weather is the severest known for many years, renders the outlook to ranchmen anything but bright.

HOLDING NIGHT SESSIONS

House of Representatives Hard Working Body

Among the most important transactions of the house during yesterday and last evening's session was the introduction of a resolution, by Jewell, of Josephine, providing for a re-apportionment of the legislative representation. This resolution is a joint one for the amendment of section 2 of article 4 of the constitution, providing that the senate shall consist of 36 members and the house of 72 members as against 20 and 30, respectively, now, and this proposed new apportionment is to be made as follows:

One representative from each county in the state and the balance to be apportioned according to the white population of the state, and the ratio of the senator shall be determined by a division of the whole number of white population of each county or district by such respective ratios and when a fraction shall result from such division, which shall exceed one-half of such ratio such county or district shall be entitled to a member for each fraction, and in case any counties shall not have the requisite population to entitle such county to be a member, then such county shall be attached to one of the adjoining counties for senatorial or representative purposes, except as provided in the resolution.

Two other joint resolutions were introduced by Mr. Gray, of Douglas, one of which provides for the printing of 5000 copies of the revised game laws of the state, and the other for 11,000 copies of the state school laws to be annotated by the superintendent of public instruction and dis-

tributed as follows: One to each district school officer of the state; 10 to each county school superintendent; 25 to each chartered educational institution, and the remainder of 10,000 is to be sent out to libraries, superintendents, colleges, etc., of other states making application for them. We shall retain 1000 copies to be sold at 25 cents each to all applicants, and the receipts are to be turned into the state treasury.

During yesterday's session the house had under consideration over 30 bills for final disposition of which number 23 were passed, two were referred for correction and amendment; three were withdrawn, two failed and two were considered in the committee of the whole and adopted.

Twenty new bills were also introduced and read the first and second times and referred to appropriate committees. When the house adjourned at 10:30 o'clock last evening there remained only twenty-eight working hours to be devoted to the consideration of over 300 house bills and it is very apparent that many of the bills which have been introduced will never again see the light of day during this session, unless the legislature should elect to hold over the constitutional period for a week or so without compensation.

Third Reading Bills.

H. B. 50, Beveridge, providing for purchase of text-books and supplies at expense of districts. Passed.

H. B. 160, Brown, to making or publishing false statements concerning affairs of corporations, etc. Referred to committee for adjustment as intended.

H. B. 198, Burns, abolishing all juries except grand, trial and inquest. Bill received only 20 affirmative votes and failed to pass.

H. B. 302, Freeman, to abolish payment of \$10 fee to district attorneys by plaintiff in divorce cases. Passed.

H. B. 195, Connell, to require county officers to turn over to treasurer all fees derived from preparation of abstracts. Passed.

H. B. 231, Washburn, permitting husband or wife to convey real estate when the other has been adjudged insane. Re-referred to judiciary.

H. B. 71, Burns, requiring public officers to answer garnishees. Passed.

H. B. 212, Jackson, to provide for bounties on certain wild animals. Motion to re-refer lost. Motion to indefinitely postpone lost. Failed to pass.

H. B. 428, joint committee on fisheries, to further protect salmon by providing for the killing of seals and sea lions at the mouth of the Columbia and making an appropriation of \$1200 therefore, contingent upon the
