House Kills Kay's Governor Mansion Bill

When the house took recess last evening it had disposed of 22 senate bills and there remained 33 up for third reading and to be acted upon before the close of the session, which, according to the resolution adopted and concurred in by both branches of the legislature, will come to an end at noon, or one minute after, tomorrow.

Among the most important of the senate bills that were passed by the house during yesterday's session was that introduced by the committee on ways and means which was the sundry appropriation bill calling for an appropriation of approximately \$75,000, including an item of \$60,000 for the payment of the state printing alone for the next two years, which also embraces a deficiency of \$10,000 from the expense of the past two years and is exclusive of the printing of the legislative records, etc. Mr. Campbell opened up hostilities by a motion to strike out the first item of the bill but he was promptly turned down by the house and, later, after the session had been adopted, it was recalled an amendment added an adopted allowing the claim of Boatman James Keating, of Astoria, \$500 as salary for his services for the past two years. A bill has been passed by the senate and is now before the house for consideration abolishing this office and when this is accomplished Mr. Keating will have been out of a job.

Another bill which received the favorable consideration was that introduced in the senate by Senator Nottingham, of Multnomah, carrying an appropriation of \$25,000 for the purpose of constructing a building and installing machinery for the generation of electricity for the lighting of all of the state institutions. This appropriation, however, is made with the understanding that it is to be used only in case the state board is unable to secure a contract with the local electric light and power companies at a reasonable rate, which has the effect of placing the board in an independent position.

Two somewhat important bills met their Waterloo at the hands of the house yesterday afternoon, one of which was the Senator Kay bill appropriating \$30,000 for the purchase of the three-quarter block of property lying east of the capitol building for the future use of the state in case it should ever be decided to erect a state printing plant, a heating plant separate from the capitol. This bill passed the senate with but slight opposition but the house failed to see the merits of the measure, either from a speculative or patriotic standpoint, and it was killed in the committee of the whole and indefinitely postponed when the committee arose and reported.

Another bill that "fell by the wayside" was that of Mr. Freeman, of Multnomah, providing for the appointment of a board of electrical examiners and to regulate the electrical workers of the state. It carried a provision allowing the members of the board of examiners a salary of \$4 per day for actual services performed, but, notwithstanding Mr. Freeman took great pains to explain that it did not effect electrical workers who were employed in the state at the time the law went into effect, strong opposition developed against the measure and it went to the waste basket. It is un-

derstood that a strong lobby has been working hard against this bill, coming from the different private and corporate electric lighting and power plants of the state, which was actuated by the fear that it meant practical legalized unionism among the electrical workers to the exclusion of outside linemen, etc.

The senate amendment to house bill 292, creating the offices of cheese and dairy inspectors and creamery inspector consolidating the office and providing for one official to look after all of the duties prescribed for two, was concurred in by the house.

FAILED BY FEW VOTES

At last the club, the bane of existence of the members of the Wasco county delegation in both branches of the legislature, has been removed from over their heads and, for the first time during the past three weeks of the session they have drawn a breath of the salubrious air of freedom. The Hood River and Cascade county bills have been put to sleep for good and all at least so far as this session is concerned and the Wasco legislators will be able to bask peacefully in the soothing embrace of that goddess, Morpheus, without fear of their refreshing slumbers being disturbed and intruded upon by that erstwhile ever-present bugaboo—"the phantom flight of red-cheeked apple baby."

The cloud burst the very first thing after the session opened yesterday afternoon and all because, as Mr. Knowles explained, he made a mistake and voted no on the question of the indefinite postponement of the proposed irrigation code when he thought he was voting upon the question of the passage of the bill as he had not only promised the house "organization" he would do, but also his constituency. He realized his mistake when it was too late but his tormentors were relentless in carrying out their designs and, no sooner had the roll been called for the afternoon session than Campbell, of Clackamas, moved a call of the house and Mr. Knowles realized, intuitively, what was coming and he arose to his feet and made haste to explain his apparent bolt upon the irrigation code, but the Hood River bill came up just the same, which was indulged in generally, and the same, which had been laid on the table three days before and put to a final vote. Not, however, until after a session of heated debate, which was indulged in generally, and the result was the defeat of the measure by a vote of 28 ayes, 31 nays, and Mr. Barrett, of Umatilla, absent.

DEMOCRAT SAVES ONE BILL

But What Can a Minority of One Man Accomplish

"Baron" Rothchild, the lonesome representative of the minority party in the lower branch of the assembly, if he ever accomplishes anything else during the balance of the session, will probably go home one of the most satisfied of the whole coterie of legislators, and the reason of his jubilant frame of mind is that at least one of the four bills which he introduced into the house succeeded in running the gauntlet of legislation in the lower house, and, if the upper branch of the assembly fails to appreciate the virtues of the measure, there is still a chance of his going home feeling that his mission to Salem has been an utter failure.

"Baron" Rothchild has been one of the most peaceable members of the house, and his patience has been almost inexhaustive; almost invariably voting with the majority, notably so in assisting to pass over the governor's veto, and seldom uplifted his voice either for or against any bill or proposition that came up. He only introduced four bills during the session; one proposing to levy a tax upon gifts, legacies, etc., which was referred to the committee on assessment and taxation, and was never heard of before; another to restrict the killing of deer, which met with a like fate as the first mentioned; another to authorize the board of trustees of the deaf mute school to take initiatory steps toward relocating the institution, which came up for final passage, but it might just as well remain in the hands of the committee, and the fourth and last, exempted Union county from the law which prohibits the killing of beaver, and this one was treated with indifference on the part of the house and was allowed to slip through.

It was believed, however, that this action was due more to ignorance of the effects of the measure or whether or not the animal referred to was a voracious beast, or otherwise, but all they could tell from Mr. Rothchild's explanation, was that it referred to "beavers," "Union county," "farmers" and something else unintelligible, and "I hope the bill will pass." And it did.

HOUSE GOES TO A SHOW

When the fixed hour arrived those members who had their hearts fixed upon seeing the show "got busy" and began to organize, with the result that when the house had only been in session scarcely more than 15 minutes and but five senate bills had been disposed of a motion was suddenly made for adjournment until 9:30 in the morning. Mr. Campbell put forth his best efforts to defeat the move, first calling for a call of the house, and then ensued a battle royal for parliamentary points of order and pandemonium reigned supreme for about 10 minutes, but Mr. Campbell was finally compelled to give in to an

overwhelming majority and adjournment was finally taken until the greatest confusion and disorder.
