The senate did some active, energetic work last night. In a session lasting three and a half hours 52 bills were acted on. Most of them were enacted into laws; some were indefinitely postponed and a few failed to pass when the vote was taken. For Swimming Championship.

New York, Feb. 23.—H. J. Handy, of Chicago, who holds most of the American swimming records not held by C. M. Daniels, will meet his rival at 1000 yards at the dual meet of the Chicago Athletic Association and the New York Athletic Club here tonight. The rivalry between Handy and Daniels has reached an acute stage, and it is expected that the record will go. Daniels has few, if any, equals in the world at sprinting distances, while Handy is better over the distance. There are other important events scheduled for the meet, including 50 and 100 yards championship races. The entries are very large and there is little doubt that the event will be the greatest in the history of American swimming.

Canada to Suspend Alien Labor Law. Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 23.—The department of labor today is considering a petition for the suspension of the alien labor law in order that Americans may be allowed to work in Canada in the spring. This action is asked for because of the scarcity of labor for railway construction work, as the contractors cannot import enough laborers from Britain and other parts of Europe. The application is being opposed by several labor unions. Big pay is offered by many lines, especially in the northwest.

To Defend Alleged Murderers.

Boston, Feb. 23.—A mass meeting of the different labor organizations in this city will be held tomorrow for the purpose of inaugurating a fund for the defense of the three officials of the Western Federation of Miners who have been arrested in Colorado Springs on a charge of murdering the governor of Idaho. A fund of about \$100,000, it is expected, will be collected by the labor unions of the country.

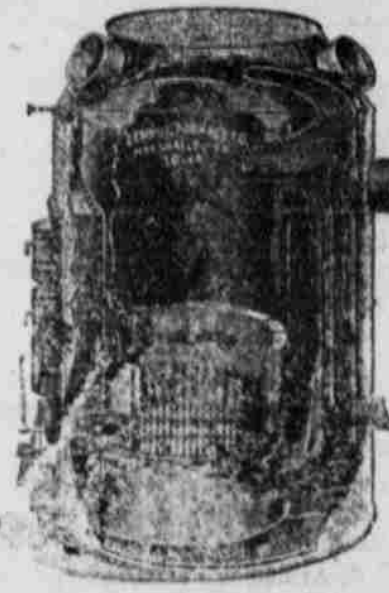
