QUARTER CENTURY IN AGE

Salem Indian Training School Celebrates Its Twenty-Sixth Anniversary

The Salem Indian Training school at Chemawa, five miles from this city, was 26 years old yesterday, and is the second oldest Indian school in the United States.

Captain Pratt started in the East, to establish the school at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, at about the same time that Captain Wilkinson obtained permission to start the Chemawa school at Forest Grove, Oregon. Pratt had the old Carlisle barracks to move into, while Wilkinson had to wait until buildings could be erected. Thus the Carlisle school had the start of the Oregon school by four and a half months.

It was February 25, 1881, that the first pupils arrived at the school, coming from the Puyallup reservation in Washington. They were 25 in number. From this small nucleus the school has grown until it has a capacity of 900 pupils, and at the present time has its full complement from Oregon, Montana and Alaska.

Cleveland's Orders Embarrassed. When Cleveland was first elected President he issued a general order sending to their regiments all army officers who had been absent therefrom for a period of four years or more. This relieved Captain Wilkinson from the Oregon school, while Captain Pratt was retained at Carlisle by a special act of congress, which protected him from the President's order. This was an unfortunate occurrence for the Oregon school, which entered upon a decade of turmoil and non-progressiveness, owing to the many changes in its management.

Prosperity Dawned in 1895. It was not until the appointment of Superintendent Thomas W. Potter, in 1895, that the school started to grow, and not until 1899 was the first of its commodious buildings erected.

From that time the school has had a steady growth until now it is one of the best equipped in the whole service. Those who have been educated here may be found in all walks of life, respected and honored by the community in which they dwell.

"Self-Support." School's Keynote. The paramount feature of the school is industrial education, its pupils being prepared to make an honest living for themselves and the girls to make good housewives. The records of the school, which are open to inspection, show it compares very favorably with like institutions in any part of the country.

To Pasteurize Milk.

FORTY PER CENT FOR WAR

And Only Three Per Cent for Waterways in the Past

Washington, Feb. 26.—For the first time in its history the United States government practically is pledged to the expenditure of what the National Rivers and Harbors congress declares to be a sum sufficient for the successful development of the country's waterways. This organization, which is composed of commercial bodies, various state and civic associations, shippers and individuals throughout the entire United States, has insisted that not less than \$50,000,000 a year should be appropriated for this work of internal improvement. Up to the present session congress has turned a deaf ear to this petition, and while appropriating more than 40 per cent of government moneys for the army, navy and pensions, has conceded to waterway development less than 3 per cent each year.

It would appear, however, that a reformation has set in in congress. The rivers and harbors appropriation bill as reported from the senate

committee on commerce, carries an increase of \$8,519,334 over the appropriation by the house. The bill now carries \$92,720,472, of which \$40,081,908 is immediately available, and the aggregate for projects authorized is \$52,638,564. It will be seen that the present cash authorization, while nearly \$10,000,000 below the sum asked for by the National Rivers and Harbors congress, discloses plainly the fact that congress is awakening to the widespread national demand for adequate appropriations for rivers and harbors.

It is altogether probable that much of congress's attitude is due to the discovery that the railroads of the country are not opposed to the plan of waterway development, but actually invite it. The fact that the steam transportation lines have been absolutely unable to care for the great increase in traffic, has brought upon them a storm of criticism and in some cases unfair abuse. As a result the railroads will welcome any auxiliary system that will relieve the present congested conditions, for it is an acknowledged fact that they cannot hope to keep abreast of the growth of commerce. The situation was summed up by J. J. Hill, president of the Great Northern, when he said that the railroads in trying to take care of present traffic conditions were "trying to force a three-inch stream through a three-quarter inch nozzle."

In its consideration of the measures reported from the house, the senate accepted an amendment sub-

mitted by Senator Hopkins, of Illinois, which will be hailed by the die west. The amendment provides for a report at the earliest practicable on the condition of the Mississippi river south of St. Louis. This in reality gives the lake-gulf deep waterway project more of an advantage in getting further appropriations in the future. It remains to be seen whether the conferees will agree to go through, but it is scarcely probable that the house conferees make much objection.

Another important amendment senate added was the appropriation of \$294,700 cash for the building lock and dam No. 7 in the Ohio and in addition the sum of \$100,000 was authorized for increased construction. The refusal of house committee to provide continuation of work on this caused some stormy scenes when Pittsburg delegations entered the capitol.
