GOVERNOR WAS RIGHT IN PRINCIPLE.

The former is the promise and the latter the realization. The promoter is the bell-weather of enterprise, and while he is just as apt to lead his followers into a financial hedgegrow as into the chosen paths of business rectitude, yet **THE WORLD OF PROGRESS HAS URGENT NEED OF HIM.**

He prods the slumbering bulk of capital with the spur of opportunity, and investment and enterprise are the result.

He has developed mines, builded railways, exploited irrigation schemes, reclaimed the desert lands to the world of agriculture and extended the avenues of commerce to the uttermost parts of the earth.

HOW TO BATHE A BABY.

Tom Maason discusses in the Marer Delinquent a subject that is of great importance, now that the legislature has adjourned.

"Many fathers stand aloof from the common domestic duties, not because they are so busy or because they are not willing, **BUT BECAUSE OF IGNORANCE.**

"How many men are there who would not gladly drop their business at any time and stay home and give the baby his bath, if they only knew how!

"Yet in reality it is much simpler than it seems. Fill the bathtub full of any good water, first carefully removing all germs. Put your elbow in occasionally to see if it is the right temperature. **IF ICE FORMS ON YOUR ELBOW** you may know the water is too cold. If there are blisters then it is too warm. Be moderate in all things.

"Take the baby firmly by both feet and shake him loose from his flannel coverings, until you begin to see safety pins ahead. **THEN REMOVE THE SAFETY PINS WITH GAS NIPPERS**, and unroll until the baby looms into sight.

"Now, having put on your rubber coat, put one hand firmly under the baby's chest and the other on his back, and launch him on the still waters. **WHEN HE HAS KICKED ALL THE WATER OUT OF THE BATHTUB**, renew as before.

"Be careful, while you are manipulating the baby, to keep him face down. Otherwise, you would not be able to put water anywhere else but in his mouth."

The above is intended for humor, but it would do any father good once in a while to bathe the baby.

MORE RAILROADS ARE NEEDED.

The entire tonnage of the United States carried by the railroads one mile has doubled in seven years. In 1897 it was 95,000,000,000 tons; in 1904 it was over 170,000,000,000; seven years more at the same rate of increase would mean 300,000,000,000 tons.

In 1904 less than 7,000,000 tons of pig iron were produced; in 1905 **ALMOST 23,000,000 TONS WERE TURNED OUT.**

In coal the country's production grew from 152,000,000 tons in 1894 to 314,000,000 in 1904.

The country has produced more than twice as much cotton in 1905 as in 1902.

Corn turned out an average yield the first five years of this decade **JUST ABOUT 50 PER CENT LARGER THAN IN THE SAME YEARS OF THE LAST DECADE.**

Wheat grew from 467,000,000 bushels in 1895 to 629,000,000 bushels in 1905.

The \$1,800,000,000 worth of livestock in 1895 increased to \$3,600,000,000 in 1905.

It is true to meet the constantly growing demand for transportation facilities the railroads have been largely expanded, but in nothing like the proportion required.

In 1894 there were 179,000 miles of railroad in operation; in 1904 there were 212,000 miles.

While iron production increased 300 per cent **RAILROAD MILEAGE INCREASED 30 PER CENT.** The number of locomotives increased from 36,000 to 48,000 between 1898 and 1904, or about 33 per cent.

Freight cars increased about 33 per cent, or from 1,284,000 to 1,728,000.

Another item emphasizing the changes most needed in the physical condition of our railroads **IS THE ENORMOUS LOSS OF LIFE ATTENDING THEIR OPERATION.**

For 1904 the interstate commerce commission reports the loss of life from railroad accidents to be 10,046, while 84,155 were injured.

In the light of these facts, it is pertinent to inquire, **WHICH DO THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES NEED MOST, a reduction in railroad rates or increased facilities for the movement of crops and the necessities of life?**

THOMAS NELSON PAGE ON THE NEGRO QUESTION.

In the March McClure's there is a noteworthy article on the negro question by Thomas Nelson Page.

Under the title of "The Great American Question—The Special Plea of a Southerner," he deals with the subject in a distinguished manner, as the following extracts from his introduction show:

"There are some things so well understood by those who know the negroes, as to appear to them almost truisms. For example,

That the white race is superior to the negro race; not accidentally and because of superior training, **BUT INHERENTLY AND FUNDAMENTALLY.**

That in certain things negroes differ widely among themselves: for example, in temper, character, training, manner, temperament.

But that in certain respects, all, or nearly all negroes, have the same race characteristics: as Indians, Chinese, Caucasians, **AND OTHER RACES HAVE THEM.**

That the negroes understand by "social equality," for the most part, one thing only: **THE RIGHT TO STAND WITH WHITE WOMEN ON PRECISELY THE SAME GROUND AS THAT ON WHICH WHITE MEN STAND WITH THEM.**

That there is a wide difference at present between the point of view of the great body of the northerners and the entire body of the southerners as to the negro; in this, that northerners espouse the cause of the negroes as a race, but dislike negroes individually, while southerners do not dislike negroes individually, but oppose them as a race.

AND THAT THIS DIFFERENCE IS DUE TO CONDITIONS AND NOT TO BASIC PRINCIPLES.

There is another vital fact not generally known to southerners: that one of the chief causes, if not the chief cause at present, of the feeling at the north in favor of the negro is the violence so often directed against negroes at the south.

There is quite as much violence against them in some other parts of the country, in proportion to the colored population, as at the south; but for reasons not necessary to discuss here, **THIS IS NOT TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT.**

The brunt of the censure falls on the south, and the south on every account, but especially for its own sake, ought to put a stop to it with relentless hand, or else make it clear to the rest of the world why it is not done.
