GETTING READY FOR BUILDING

At an informal meeting of the board of trustees for the insane asylum, yesterday afternoon, initial steps were taken to make preliminary provisions for the erection of the new wing to the institution, for which an appropriation was made at the recent session of the legislature, and Superintendent Calbreath was authorized to ascertain the cost and procure a brick making machine for the manufacture of the material for the building, work upon which will begin as soon as possible. Senator Smith, of the ways and means committee of the legislature, was also in attendance upon the meeting and explained to the board the use intended for the appropriation of \$25,000 for the increase of the attendants salaries to the effect that the wage schedule furnished the committee by the attendants was used simply as a basis upon which to make the estimate of the amount needed and the matter of arranging a permanent schedule will be left entirely with the board.

TWENTY WEEKS IN NEW YORK

"Forty-five Minutes From Broadway" Makes a Great Hit

One of the most notable theatrical entertainments booked for the present season in this city is Geo. M. Cohan's fascinating musical play "Forty-five Minutes from Broadway" which comes to the Grand Saturday evening, March 2, with Corinne as the star supported by a noteworthy company under the direction of Klaw & Erlanger. The play has enjoyed unusual success since its first production over a year ago, its run of twenty weeks in New York and thirty weeks in Chicago having proved immensely profitable to its managers. This piece is a novelty, and consists of comedy, drama, burlesque, melodrama and musical comedy most cleverly intermixed in an interesting story possessed of an

unusual degree of novelty. In his selection of characters and in the originality of situations, Mr. Cohan has shown the same genius for getting together novelty and surprises that was noticeable in his popular "Little Johnny Jones."

Corinne plays the part of Mary, a servant girl in the Castleton household in New Rochelle. This suburb is just 45 minutes from Broadway by rail, and this circumstance gives the piece its title. Revolving about Mary in the development of the story are a young millionaire, a soubrette, a mercenary mother, a villainous stock broker, many minor characters, and Kid Burns, a young Broadway boy of strong arm and noble heart, who expresses a great deal of practical philosophy in most entertaining slang. site to that played by Corinne is acted by Scott Welsh, who has made a great individual success in it.

Klaw & Erlanger has given the piece their usual elaborate mounting. The three scenes utilized in staging it represent the exterior of the Castleton mansion in New Rochelle in the morning, the drawing-room in the evening and the railroad station the next morning.

This production is so entirely different from anything that has previously been seen here in the way of light entertainment that it is sure to attract comment. While it possesses many of the original characteristics of the author, it is regarded by all who have seen it as the best work that Mr. Cohan has done and a wide departure from "Little Johnny Jones," "The Governor's Son," and other work from his pen.

KELLIHER SECURES OPENING

Through the granting of the request of A. T. Kelliher and his counsel, G. G. Bingham, to make first payment upon a half section of land that was covered by one of the certificates, secured upon one of the forged H. H. Turner applications, a way has been opened by the state land board whereby Mr. Kelliher can realize and make good to John De Laitre, of St. Paul, Minnesota, upon all of the bogus certificates involving approximately 80,000 acres of state school lands. Mr. Kelliher appeared before the board yesterday afternoon in person and by his attorney, and made application for permission to pay down the first payment upon one of the tracts of land involved and make surrender of the old certificate and the board, after much argument, finally decided to grant him this permission. If they will do it upon one, the precedent once established, it is believed that the same privilege will be extended to all of the certificates and, by this means, Mr. Kelliher may yet be able to make good to Mr. DeLaitre who will doubtless pay the balance upon the certificates and secure a valid title to the lands, after being defeated in the state and federal courts.

DUNBAR OUTLINES DEFENSE

Through a motion filed in the circuit court yesterday afternoon, in the suit of J. K. Sears vs. former Secretary of State Dunbar, for an accounting and turning over of fees collected into the state treasury, Secretary Dunbar opened way to attack upon the complaint on the statute of limitation ground in asking that the plaintiff be required to specify as to dates, amount of fees collected and from whom and for what purposes collected and whether or not such fees had been collected within the past six years. United States Senator C. W. Fulton, his brother, G. Clyde Fulton, of Astoria; and G. G. Bingham, of this city, appear as Mr. Dunbar's attorneys. If the action is maintained by the court it is estimated that over \$100,000 in fees is involved.
