BATTLE SHIP OF FUTURE.

Fully Equipped for War But May Never Fire a Shot

Washington, March 1.—"Here's to the American battleship! May it ever be prepared for war, but never fire a shot." In this pithy toast, Representative George E. Foss, of Illinois, chairman of the house committee on naval affairs, at the banquet of the naval league of the United States, summed up the sentiments of President Roosevelt which were voiced at the White House earlier in the day. The delegates to the league called on Mr. Roosevelt and listened to a short but powerful address, in which the President urged them to continue the agitation for greater appropriations for the naval establishment. Mr. Roosevelt showed his interest in the league by saying:

"Now, I want all of you in your respective homes, through the organs of public opinion, by your influence upon your representatives in every branch at Washington, to see that the needs of the navy are not forgotten in the future. The navy has no one to speak for it save those who speak for it because of their devotion to the honor and the interest of the United States, and I ask that you and those like you make your voices heard for the general welfare, amid the din of voices that speak only for special interests."

With the senate chamber as the stage and twenty dignified United States senators as the dramatis personae, an evening audience gathered in the galleries witnessed the production of what might be termed the drama of "National Prosperity." These two score legislators one evening this week passed the rivers and harbors bill, carrying more than \$92,000,000 and the naval bill, appropriating approximately \$101,000,000, in 77 minutes. This was appropriating government moneys at the rate of \$2,500,000 a minute, or \$41,600 a second. While the passage of the big naval bill was received with applause, largely owing to the present ticklish relations with Japan, the record-breaking sum voted for the improvement of the rivers and harbors received even a more vociferous recognition, for its passage indicated that the national government had been aroused to the necessity for devoting more money and more attention to the needs of commerce, which hitherto have been overlooked in the preparation for wars that fail to materialize. The bill has passed by the senate carries an increase of \$8,519,334 over that passed by the house. Of the total of more than \$92,000,000 carried by the bill, upwards of \$40,000,000 is immediately available the remainder being voted for continuing the work of such contracts as are now under way. While the amount of cash voted is still nearly \$10,000,000 under the sum that the National Rivers and Harbors congress contends is necessary to prosecute this development work, the present bill is regarded as a long step toward the ultimate recognition of this organization's ideals. The record-breaking rivers and harbors measure is the outgrowth of existing traffic congestion, and the acknowledgment of the railroads that they are unable to care for the vast transportation problems that have arisen as a result of the country's wonderful prosperity. This increase in commerce thus will have to find an outlet in some other direction, which logically is through the waterways of the country.

Representative Champ Clark, of Missouri, gave a novel dinner this week at which nineteen of the "lame ducks" of the house were his guests. The term "lame duck" is used to specify a member of congress whose constituents, by their votes, have decided on his return to private life. General Grosvenor was the star guest, and next came Mr. Sibley, of Pennsylvania. These two were the only Republicans present, the remaining seventeen being Democratic members who on March 4th will sever their connection with the government pay roll. Congressman Clark was the only real live congressman present.

Senator Burkett, of Nebraska, was chosen to read the farewell address of George Washington before the senate this week. The Nebraska was selected for the honor because of his excellent speaking-voice, and he did himself proud. Mr. Bur-

ckett at one time was a teacher of elocution. Senator Teller, of Colorado, is back in his seat after a three-weeks' siege of the grippe. He has been confined to his bed most of that time, and for a while his condition gave his friends much uneasiness. The senior Colorado senator is in his seventy-seventh year, but still active and hearty. His illness was a new experience for him, for he declares that he cannot recollect ever having been sick enough before to make his staying in the house more than a day.

Doukhobors Causing Trouble. Yorkton, Sask., Feb. 28.—So troublesome have the Doukhobors become that mounted police had to be requisitioned to keep them in order. They have refused to pay taxes and attacked the head collector and his staff when they called for the taxes. They contend that they are not subject to taxes as they are living in communal colonies. The Doukhobors, who until a few years ago were a source of annoyance because some of them insisted on going naked, have become famous farmers and are growing rich, maintain many of their ancient customs. Prosecutions are now pending against 99 of them for an attack on the tax collector and a bill will be introduced into parliament to dispossess them of their lands unless they consent to become citizens.

CANNERY FOR BROWNSVILLE.

Large Tract of Land and Business Property Change Hands.

One of the largest deals consummated lately was made yesterday, when Edward Holloway bought the A. C. Hausman land, joining the city.

The tract contains 120 acres and is all fine bottom land, 20 acres of it being in fine old hops; there is also 169 lots in North Brownsville included in the deal. Mr. Hausman is a pioneer here, and has laid out two additions to Brownsville.

The 120 acres will be platted into five and ten-acre tracts and put on the market by the Brownsville Real Estate Company at once.

Mr. Holloway & Company have purchased a building near the depot, 50x90 feet, and will remodel it into a cannery.

B. M. Cushman this week purchased the Sarah Walker 80-acre farm. This land lies a mile and a half east of Brownsville. The sale was made by the Brownsville Real Estate Company, R. W. Tripp, manager.
