Missoula, Mont., March 5.—At the farmers institute convention which was held here today there were some important addresses by prominent people. I. D. Big Cotton Mill for Montreal.
Montreal, March 5.—Work commenced today on a new cotton mill here which, when completed, will give employment to nearly 1000 hands. It will save 1200 looms and 40,000 spindles. W. J. Whitehead, formerly of the Dominion Textile factory is the promoter of the company, which has a capital of \$2,000,000. Mr. Whitehead says the demand for cotton goods in Canada is great and that the tremendous development of the Dominion at large has grown away beyond the capacity of the present source of supply.

Seattle's Gold.
Seattle, March 5.—The total value of gold received at the United States assay office at Seattle in 1906 was \$23,346,938, as compared with \$18,873,850 in 1905. The year just closed was a record one, the highest total of any previous year having been \$22,038,796 in 1900. Of the gold received last year \$5,670,086 was from the Canadian Yukon, and \$16,141,492 from Alaska. The grand total of gold received at this office since its establishment is \$139,353,686, of which Alaska contributed \$47,606,099, the Canadian Yukon \$82,365,352 and British Columbia \$8,113,863. The remainder came from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, with a small amount from miscellaneous sources.

Oil Struck in Malheur.
Baker City March 5.—Much excitement and a small-sized sensation were created in Baker City yesterday when the news arrived that oil had been struck in paying quantities in Malheur county, 12 miles west of Vale, and about 50 miles southwest of Baker City, by a man who was prospecting for coal. The telegram came to J. B. Bowden, and requested him to hurry to the spot to protect his interests. Mr. Bowden left for Vale last night, and will investigate the strike.

Three or four years ago several sections of oil lands in Malheur county were surveyed and taken up by local Baker City people. Combinations of outside capital, presumably the oil trust, prevented the thorough exploitation of the field. Now it is believed that, under present conditions, if the strike reported is found to be correct, nothing will prevent the Baker City people from relocating their holdings and putting the property on the market.
