NATIONAL GUARD INSPECTION.

Company M Made Fine Showing Last Night—Complimented by Col. Jackson.

The members of Company M have a right to feel proud of the excellent showing they made last night. The company was inspected by Colonel James Jackson, U. S. A., retired, of Portland, who is state inspector of all Oregon troops and United States inspecting officer, and his report is very satisfactory. The colonel said last night that the boys deserve great credit for the showing that they made, which entitled them to a higher ranking than was given at the last inspection. Captain Murphy mustered out the entire command, and received 100 per cent for attendance. Company M was the third company to receive that marking. Companies A, of Eugene, and K, of Portland, having had a full attendance.

Captain Murphy put his company through many intricate and extended maneuvers, and in all, notwithstanding there were many new men, the commands were executed with precision and snap. The boys of the local company are popular in social circles, and a large crowd of their gentlemen and lady friends were present to see the inspection, and express their appreciation of their excellent performance, but they, as well as the boys of the militia, were disappointed in not having the pleasure of "the light fantastic" after the inspection. Owing to a misunderstanding an orchestra was not provided, and the dance, which had been looked forward to as one of the good things of the evening, had to be eliminated.

Colonel Jackson said, after the inspection, that Salem should have a good signal corps. Washington had one, and there was no good reason that Salem should not organize one. The work in this would be very important, interesting and instructive. The government will, upon the organization, furnish all apparatus and uniforms, which would consist of telegraph instruments, surveying outfit and all apparatus connected with the field work.

The members of the company and the officers were very much interested in the work, and think that a corps of 60 men should be organized. Doubtless that many will be glad to take advantage of this excellent opportunity to learn telegraphy or some line that is connected with the signal work.

During yesterday afternoon Col. Jackson inspected the property of the

company, and among other things 10 Krag-Jorgensen rifles were condemned.

Company orders have been issued announcing the regular quarterly state inspection of Company M on Thursday evening, March 27th, after which dancing will be enjoyed. The boys say there will be no mistake about the music this time, and invite their many friends to be present to help make an enjoyable evening.

SKIFF WOULD ENJOIN

Says Price Proposed To Be Paid Is Exorbitant

Mark S. Skiff, the well-known Salem capitalist, appeared before the state asylum board and protested against the purchase of the 24 acres of land from Mrs. Chas. Rielly for \$10,000. He says the land has been offered the state at different times for from \$6000 to \$7000. The land is very valuable to the state just now, as it abuts against the asylum property and is needed if the new wing is to be built. Mr. Skiff says he has no grievance, but merely appears as a taxpayer, asking that the state do what is fair and right by the taxpayers generally. He says the legislature has appropriated \$10,000 to buy lands with, but not necessarily for this particular land. He says it is one of the jobs of the legislature to make it appear that way, and was done to enable the owners to exact an unjust amount out of the state. Messrs. Moore and Dunbar offered at one time \$7000 for the land, but that was considered an outside price. He says that land not 50 yards off has been sold within a year for \$130 an acre, and that the proper proceedings is to condemn the land and have the value appraised and conveyed to the state at its true market value, which will be found to be far below \$400 per acre.

Former Salem Man Is Appointed Member of the State Board of Examiners.

Governor Chamberlain has appointed T. M. Leabo, of Portland, a member of the state Board of Barber Examiners, to succeed William Wanner, whose term has expired. The three members of the board are now H. G. Myer, Salem, 1910; R. R. Wallace, 1909, and Mr. Leabo.

The appointment was made by the governor by request of the labor interests of Portland. Mr. Leabo was at one time an employee at the state insane asylum, and was a leader in the street car strike at Portland. He is a member of the barbers' union, has been in business for a number of years, and is well known in labor circles throughout the state.

We are asked, as an independent Republican newspaper, to give our opinion of the recent legislature of Oregon. The legislature wasted too much time in the beginning, and then had not sufficient time to give to the consideration of meritorious and unmeritorious bills. Too much time was also wasted in the endeavor to circumvent the governor, undoubtedly representing the people, if he was playing politics, as claimed, and the legislature in many respects not representing the people and in one, at least, slapping the people in the face. The governor proved that he stood on constitutional and economical ground and put the legislature in a deep hole, from which it is trying to but cannot very well crawl out without the assistance of a rope, which the general public seems very unwilling to provide. In a comparatively few instances the Legislature has accomplished some good, but in many features it was a miserable failure, one close observer considering it a silly body. The people naturally feel that the legislature has been too extravagant, and are thankful that we had an executive who knew how and when to use the veto axe, and was not afraid to wield it. It was plainly discernable that throughout the legislative session the normal school combine was the dictatorial power, and on this account the people were not faithfully nor fully served. A number of good bills were killed, and the senate gave unmistakable evidence that it was there for the benefit of the rich.
