### Plot to Seize Celebes Islands.

Capetown, March 9.—The local police have just learned the details of an audacious filibustering in the Malay Archipelago, situated to the east of Borneo. A band of 3000 armed adventures planned to concentrate and descend on the island and hold it by force against the Dutch while its mineral riches were being developed and worked. It was intended, however, to demand mining concessions from the Dutch government, and only to employ force in the event of a refusal. The police got a clue to the plot, and, following the trail, were led to said premises in this city. Where they seized a number of documents relating to the organization of the enterprise, which, it is alleged has branches in England, on the continent, in the United States and other countries.

### Stock Exchange Seat Brings \$75,000.

New York, March 9.—A noticeable drop in the price of stock exchange memberships has been recorded when it is announced that a seat on the exchange has been sold for 75,000. The latest previous sale of a seat, which occurred three weeks ago, was made at \$80,000, and during 1905 and 1906 seats brought as much as \$95,000. No reason, except the unsettled and unsatisfactory condition of the stock market was assigned for the sudden falling off.
