Albany, N. Y., March 13.—The assembly codes committee is giving a hearing today to the advocates and opponents of baseball on Sunday, as set forth in the Mooney Sunday baseball bill. **Captured Honduras Arms.**  
San Francisco, March 13.—Word was received this afternoon that the Pacific Mail liner, City of Para, plying between San Francisco and Central America, was seized by the Nicaraguan government for carrying contraband of war.

About 236 cases of arms were taken off the Para, which was then released and allowed to proceed to its destination. The arms were intended for Honduras.
