Costly Ball Room.

Newport, R. I., March 14.—"Belcourt" the summer home of O. H. P. Belmont, at this place, before another summer will be improved extensively and beautified, contracts already having been awarded that amount to \$300,000. The principal addition and alteration will be the transformation of the coach house into a ball room fashioned in Louis XIV style. The cost of this alone will amount to more than \$50,000 and when completed it will make one of the most beautiful ball rooms to be found anywhere in Newport's summer colony. The main staircase, according to the plans, is to be altered at a cost of \$18,000, and the whole decorative scheme is to undergo a complete change.

Kentucky Senatorial Convent.

Mayfield, Ky., March 14.—A district convention is in session today at Fulton to nominate a Democratic candidate to succeed Hon. Henry George. The Hon. John R. Ray, present representative from this county, has announced himself a candidate for the state senate, and Sam Norton is also in the field. Prof. Houston Brooks, a prominent school teacher of this county, has announced himself a candidate for the legislature, and Leon Vans, a druggist here, is also expected to announce his candidacy.

PAPER MILL RAISE WAGES.

Six Hundred Men Get Ten Per Cent Increase.

Oregon City, March 14.—Six hundred men who are employed in the mills of the Willamette Pulp & Paper company and the Crown company have received a 10 per cent increase in their wage scale, which means that all unskilled employees who have been receiving \$2 per day for nearly a year will get \$2.20. Thirty-five thousand dollars a year will be added to the payrolls of the paper mills in west Oregon City. The notices were posted Monday by President William Pierce Johnson, of the Willamette Pulp & Paper company, and Superintendent E. J. Daulton, of the Crown Columbia Pulp & Paper company, and the raise became effective yesterday.

Until less than one year ago the wage schedule of the unskilled laborers in the paper mills was \$1.75 per day, when a raise of 25 cents was made, making a total increase in the pay of \$50,000 per year. Three years ago the scale was \$1.50 a day, and a general raise of 25 cents was made. Monday's action on the part of the management, due to the increased cost of living, is the third lift in the scale of wages that has been made in three years' time.

This is not the only benefit that will accrue, for immediately upon the return of General Manager Norman R. Lang, of the Willamette Pulp & Paper company, from San Francisco, a new schedule will be announced for the skilled labor in the mill. Mr. Lang is expected home the latter part of this week. The management of the Crown-Columbia Pulp & Paper company will also issue an increase for skilled labor in a few days.

The total payroll of the two paper mills, the woolen mill and small factories in this city is more than \$1,000,000 a year. More than 50 per cent of the total is expended in Oregon City.

MAY GO TO ASYLUM.

Examination of Bloss Not Yet Finished—Second Time in Jail.

Roseburg, March 14.—Wm. Bloss the aged slayer of Philander Lemon, was taken before Justice Long, but his examination was postponed until next Monday. The examination of Bloss as to his sanity has not yet been completed, and if he is adjudged insane it will end his case, as he would have to be committed to the asylum.

A coincidence, in connection with Bloss' case is that Justice Long acted as his counsel in defending him on a charge of assault and battery about seven years ago, and the magistrate before whom the case was heard was Prof. H. J. Robinson, then justice of the peace in Roseburg, and who last Saturday furnished the information that caused Bloss' arrest. Bloss served 15 days in jail for that offense. The prosecuting witness was Charles Steiniger, a well-known German resident of this city. Mr. Steiniger aided Bloss in many ways during the latter's less prosperous days. He says Bloss was mean and treacherous, but he attributes these traits to a partial insanity. Bloss is not a Swiss, Mr. Steiniger says, but a Saxon German. Bloss was a Prussian cavalryman, and served on the Austrian frontier during the Crimean war.

New Civil Service Law.

The new civil service law as applied to city carriers and clerks provides that they shall receive \$600 for the first year's service, \$800 for the second, \$900 for the third and \$1000 for the fourth. The law provides that clerks and carriers shall have the same grade for equal time service and should either a clerk be given the position of clerk or carrier

so changed will not lose the grade he had before such change. The department has the right to lower grade or refuse promotion owing to incompetency or other good reasons.

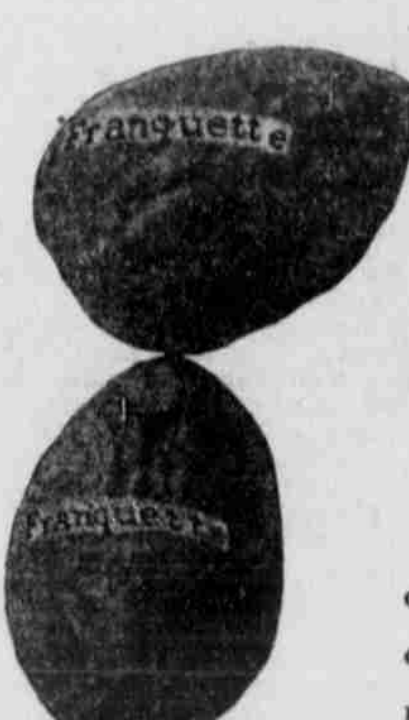
