PRIMARY CITY LAWS.

Charter Changes May Originate by Initiative Petition or Without.

The recent enacted charter changing law has been published and as a result it is now known definitely what the law provides and steps can be taken accordingly.

Under the terms of the law a city council may propose amendments to its charter, either with an initiative petition or without one. However, it may be safer to have a petition so as to make matters secure should any litigation occur. There is a possibility that the law may be unconstitutional in the provision giving the council the power it does, and in view of the financial interests involved it is thought wiser to have an initiative petition.

As the law contained the emergency clause, it is now in effect and the local people may proceed at once with charter changing. There is every reason for believing that they will do so.

As to just what will be proposed in the way of changes is not yet known, though it is practically certain that provisions will be made for some modifications. The committee named by Mayor Rodgers is to report a plan for a charter commission on next Monday evening.

Paris Sweet Tooth for Horseflesh.

Paris, March 16.—No matter what other people's tastes and sensitiveness are, Paris has no prejudice to horseflesh, and partakes of it with great freedom, and in such quantities and so regularly that the consumption of man's best friend has reached 40,000 carcasses yearly. Some have been cart horses, some gay carriage horses and have drawn dainty ladies through the brilliant thoroughfares, nothing more brilliant along the boulevards than these self-same horses that now serve as good for Paris needy people, but some also for her gourmands. The 40,000 animals eaten represent about 11,000,000 kilograms of horseflesh, as compared with the earlier figures of 1899, when a total of only 5,000,000 was eaten. The business seems to be growing rapidly, so that the horse butcher is assuming the position of quite a respectable competitor with the beef butcher. Horse butcher signs, with a bold horse-head above the door, are numerous in certain sections of the city, and horse butchers are rapidly pre-empting stalls in the market house. It is charged that the doctors are in league with the butchers, as they are more and more recommending horseflesh for certain patients.
