BOYS ON THE TRAINS

Slow Passenger Trains Are Menace to School Children

The overland passenger train that came through the city an hour late today, when it passed the East Salem school, was boarded by the boys, and at each vestibule had several lads aboard. Some of them were even riding on the ends of the journal boxes, in a very dangerous position. The trains, running at the ordinance speed, permits this, and the longer this continues the greater the danger, as it is impossible to keep school boys from boarding such slow-moving trains.

Salem and Portland papers continue to give Alderman Haas great prominence for his achievement, and the Oregonian today prints more matter about the situation that has made Salem the laughing stock of the country. The railroad officials have not yet begun to retaliate, but it is believed they will cut Salem out of all favorable consideration in the distribution of advertising matter and in bringing in of Eastern people, which is now proceeding on a large scale. The press is being censured for giving Alderman Haas undeserved prominence, as some of the papers have been publishing his bulletins and communications to Superintendent Fields before they were mailed. Here is the latest from the Oregonian today:

Urging Haas to Fight.
 "Whether or not Alderman Haas will be successful in his fight to make the Southern Pacific Company conform to the speed regulations of the city, is an important question to the people of Salem at present. Mr. Haas has succeeded in stirring up one of the warmest fights that has ever been witnessed in this city.

"It is asserted by some that the company will retaliate by not stopping the early morning train at Salem. Mr. Haas says that this threat does not worry him in the least, because it is the duty of the railway commission to settle just such trouble as that. Mr. Haas stated this morning that he is in the fight to stay, and that he does not propose to back down under any circumstances.

Mr. Haas has prepared a communication for publication, in which he clearly sets out his position, and positively declares that he will arrest every engineer who exceeded the speed limit.

"It was learned on good authority this morning that a bill is being prepared by some members of the council which is to allow the trains to run at full speed through the suburbs, but it will require them to comply with the present regulations while passing through the thickly settled portion of the city."

POWERS CHOSEN AGAIN

At the regular meeting of the Salem Board of Education, City Superintendent J. M. Powers was again chosen for another year as the head of the Salem schools, this being his third engagement at the Capital City. Mr. Powers took the position originally with some reluctance, succeeding a very able man, L. R. Travers, who had outgrown the situation of this district to retain his services. He has developed slowly into one of the most efficient public school men in the state, and, while he was rather diffident about asserting himself, the entire teaching force love Superintendent Powers, and the children in all the schools acknowledge that they like him as a teacher. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, and his retention by the Salem board is a vote of confidence in his ability to fill the position at the head of the second largest schools in the state.

The Board of Education have re-elected Superintendent Powers thus early, in order that he might know that he was giving satisfaction, and to save him the usual effort made by teachers to hunt other jobs. Mr. Powers has the greatest pride in the Salem schools, and gives them his first, sole and best thoughts for their success. He is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, has had about ten years' experience in other states. He received the entire vote of the board, except E. M. Croisan, who stated that he did not consider Mr. Powers competent, and that there should be competition for the place. The report of Director Lee for new walks around the North Salem school was adopted and the walks ordered built. Several bills were ordered paid, and the board adjourned.
