Build Up, Not Tear Down.

Ed. Journal: While all rational people in Salem are glad that the slow-train embargo has been removed, it is none the less a very bad thing for our town to have had it brought on. In the first place, we have antagonized the only railroad we have, and, even though it may be a soulless corporation, we need it and want its good will. In the next place we have again become the laughing stock of Oregon, just to gratify the whim of a petty alderman who is "steered" by grasping politicians, whether he knows it or not. And lastly, we have now less protection in case of accident than we would have had had the old law stood. Under the old ordinance nobody has ever been injured, but if such a calamity had occurred the interested parties would have been in a better position to collect damages than they will now be. But then, the howlers for "enforce the ordinances or repeal them" have demonstrated the logic of their whang-doodle. It still remains that some laws are better in the breach than in the performance, but the political stool-pigeons have had their day in court, and they don't seem to care how ridiculous they make their community. In many instances a law that is not enforced is better left on the statute books than taken off, for it is useful when needed. All will admit that the ten commandments are not lived up to, but few would have the temerity to suggest their repeal or abolition. Perhaps these "enforce or repeal" jingoes would like to have the decalogue repealed too. It is not "enforced."

BUILDING MATERIAL.

A Shortage of Lime—Lumber, Lath and Shingle Situation.

(Portland Daily Abstract.)

The strike of the millmen is, of itself, a sufficiently vexatious matter to contractors with unfinished buildings on their hands, but this is not all there is to embarrass building operations. The old complaint of a shortage of cars is still unanswered. Take the question of lime, for instance. Most of the local dealers receive their supply from the San Juan Island kilns in Puget sound. The demand seems to exceed the capacity to produce and the car shortage prevents prompt deliveries. The schooner trade between San Juan Island and San Francisco, where the present demand is enormous, embarrasses Portland dealers. Hardly a barrel is to be found in the city. The price has advanced from the old figure of \$1.50 to \$1.65. One firm has announced to its customers that it will not fill orders even at \$1.65 for future delivery, which indicates another advance soon. Nottingham & Co. has possibly 400 or 500 barrels that will arrive before long. The J. M. McCracken Co. states that it has probably 2000 barrels en route, somewhere between Tacoma and Portland. These supplies will relieve the lime famine partially, and the railroads hope to be able to supply sufficient cars soon.

As to Portland cement, now so much in demand for concrete work, it is estimated by one authority that

there are probably 100,000 barrels in the city at present. Nottingham & Co. expect a big cargo in June.

Inquiries at the City Brick Agency show that there is no shortage of old stock, and that a large and plentiful supply of new brick will be added about the middle of May. Last year brick sold for \$8; now they are quoted at \$9.50. The advance is due, so the manufacturers state, to the increased cost of fuel and of labor. The supply of wooden laths is somewhat

scanty. There seems to be plenty of shingles. Last year shingles were quoted at \$2.25; now they are \$3.

During the continuance of the strike mills are not generally filling orders for lumber. There is not a large supply on hand. Contractors fear another advance when the mills resume, and the opinion is prevalent, whether true or not, that the lumbermen will claim such advance as reasonable, evidently expecting the loggers to screw up their prices a notch or two.

The sash and door situation is bad but it is not thought to be due to the strike directly, but to an excessive demand which the mills seem unable to meet. As to window glass it is the conservative opinion that the shipments here this season will not be above normal; or about 200 cars. The Pennsylvania and Indiana factories are not shipping largely of standard sizes. When the pinch comes, the only thing dealers can do is to cut down large sizes into small and advance the price to cover loss in waste. Portland could probably utilize this year 300 cars—"and then some."

So far as learned the visible supply of builders' hardware is equal to the demand. On the other hand, owing to the unprecedented prosperity all over the country, there is a great shortage of tools of nearly every kind. A. Dekum says that this is so because none of the tool-manufacturing plants were able to foresee the extraordinary demand, and consequently cannot fill orders.

EUGENE CATHOLIC CHURCH.

Church Would Do Credit to Any City.

Eugene, March 18.—Through the courtesy of Father O'Farrell, a press representative was given a view of the Catholic church last night under the electric lights, and it was a revelation to him.

The seatings are all in place, and they have received their last coat of varnish. They were made by Midgley, and the handsomest grained boards were selected. They are of our own Oregon Douglas fir, than which there is no handsomer wood to be finished in its natural grain. It is stained with just enough brown to bring out the grain of the wood and then given a coat of filler and two coats of varnish.

The altar is a handsome piece of work, and reflects great credit on the architect, as well as the craftsman who made it. It has now received several coats of pure white paint without any gloss, and is to receive two more coats. From any part of the room, as it stands out from its setting against a background of dark red, it looks as though it was

carved from the purest Parian marble.
