Nipissing Mining Company Fishing Work.

New York, March 22.—The directors of the Nipissing Mining Company have given orders that work shall be pushed largely, and to that end, at the meeting of the directors it was ordered that the men's quarters be greatly enlarged at the mines so as to accommodate 300 to 400 more men. This action was taken as the company contemplates materially increasing its operations in the spring. It is understood that other matters were considered, including the building of a spur of the government railroad into the mines, but nothing definite was done. There will be no passing of dividends, the financial condition being excellent, as there is about \$600,000 in the company's treasury in cash.

Nicaraguans Win a Great Battle.

Washington, March 22.—The state department has a dispatch which says the Nicaraguan government reports that on March 18th 5000 Salvadoreans and 1000 Hondurans, commanded by Presa, attacked the Nicaraguan vanguard, near Managua. The battle lasted three days. It resulted in a route of the Salvadoreans, who lost 1000 killed. Nicaragua has 20,000 men at the front, and will commence an immediate attack upon Cholutra and Tegucigalpa.

American Boys Win at Oxford.

London, March 22.—The annual athletic meet of Oxford and Cambridge occurred today. Oxford won by a score of 8½ to one-half. The Americans were prominent, a Rhodes scholar from the states, now at Oxford, winning three first and one second. H. M. Young, of South Dakota, won both long and high jumps; Stevens, formerly of Yale, threw the weight 135 feet, 9 inches, which is the record for the games, and W. E. Schutt, formerly of Cornell, won second in the half-mile race.
