Handful Closes Engagement.
New York, March 23.—The engagement of Richard Mansfield at the New Amsterdam theater, which has been extended, closes tonight.

It has been a very successful engagement. It has been known that the actor of Peter Gyst severely taxes the actor's strength and endurance, and that he has been advised to discontinue his tour.

Mr. Mansfield will now go to Brooklyn, and thence to Baltimore, and other cities of New York, and in New England, including Providence, a place in which he has not appeared for many years.

The present dramatic season will close on April 27. Mr. Mansfield's representative sends out the following message: "The demands on the artist's emotional and physical powers are so great and the program is so vast, that it is inadvisable to place Peter Gyst in his customary tour for him to play it over

an extended period. It is, therefore, certain that the performances at the New Amsterdam, just concluded, will be the last in New York, and the Ibsen comedy will be given only occasionally next year, and not after."

Pittsfield's Park Anniversary.
Pittsfield, Mass., March 23.—The 25th anniversary of the Park club is being celebrated today with great gusto. A very large and most active executive committee has charge of the affair, and citizens generally are actively interested in the proceedings.

Addresses and music by a local orchestra are the order of the day, and a great crowd, composed of the club members and their friends, who are legion, is enjoying the event.

The club done Pittsfield much good in various ways. Its splendidly decorated rooms have no equal in western Massachusetts.

During his talk Mr. Finley showed a remarkable series of photographs that he and his partner, Mr. Herman T. Bohlman, have collected about the woods and fields. The results they have secured show that these two naturalists are tireless workers, and they are not the least backward in risking life and limb to portray and study the life of our rarer birds.

The lecturer showed many intimate studies of hawks, owls, woodpeckers, chickadees, wrens, warblers, hummingbirds and others that were made only after spending days and weeks about the natural haunts of these creatures.

Perhaps the most difficult and trying work in bird photography accomplished by Mr. Finley and his companion was getting a series of pictures on the hummingbird, a feathered sprite, which taxed the camera and photographer for their most rapid work.

Many of the exposures were made on 1-1000 part of a second, and the poised bird with whirling wings shown on the screen attested the delicacy of the task.

No doubt the most dangerous and exciting experiences were undergone in securing a set of photographs on the red-tailed hawk, which were taken near the top of a tall cottonwood tree, 120 feet from the ground.

Seven different trips were made to the red-tail's home necessitating the climb to the topmost branches of the tree to get pictures of the family, and views showing the method of their photography.

After the formal meeting, the lecturer, in an informal way, talked to the Salem bird lovers assembled and the result was a call for a meeting at the Unitarian church next Tuesday evening for the reorganization of the local work for the coming season. Wm. Warner, the Salem bird authority, was present with a large number of bird skins of Oregon and other birds, which attracted great attention. A rising vote of thanks was given Mr. Finley at the close of his helpful talk.

Hear Lecture by W. L. Finley and Witness Beautiful Pictures

Mr. William L. Finley, lecturer for the National Association of Audubon Societies, gave a stereopticon lecture at the high school assembly hall last evening on "The Home Life of Wild Birds." The meeting was under the auspices of the State Audubon Society, and the Salem Bird Study Club, and was largely attended, notwithstanding the inclement weather.

In opening Mr. Finley emphasized the work that has been done by this organization in protecting the wild birds and animals. In his lecture he showed conclusively why our common songsters should be protected from the plume hunter, not only on account of their aesthetic value to man, but because of their economic importance in our daily life.
